No tax increase in Lehigh Township

Lehigh Township's 2015 budget does not include a tax increase. The budget was adopted as advertised during the December 7 township supervisors' meeting. Supervisor Jill Redash-Capossela said she disagreed with reducing the road maintenance line item to 0, and not including anything for storm water management, but agreed with the overall numbers. Supervisor chair Larry Skinner noted that some of the money had to be shifted to deal with stream crossing at Pump House Road. All three supervisors voted in favor the budget, and the tax resolution.

The garbage fee resolution was also adopted. Garbage bills will be out by January 15. The due date will be February 29. Going forward, the bills will be out by the first day of the quarter, and due 45 days after that.

Exploring energy supplier price quotes came up with lower rate from Pennsylvania Gas & Electric. Their quote was for a fixed rate, including

the outdoor rate. Supervisors decided to switch to the plan with a cost of .08970/kwh for 18 months, if there are no penalties or transfer fees for switching.

Supervisors exonerated Carbon Search & Settlement from garbage fees. The former owners of the property in question are deceased.

The annual reorganization meeting will take place at 1 p.m. on Monday, January 4,

A New Year's Wish

White Haven council wraps up 2015

White Haven Fire Chief Dean Raudenbush reported 388 hours of service for November during the December 21 council meeting. In addition to a fire in Freeland, the company escorted Santa Claus to home visits, and held their monthly hoagie fundraiser. Next hoagie sale is slated for Super Bowl Sunday.

New radios have been received from the Carbon County Comm Center. Public Works supervisor Dave Dorneman said that the parking lot at Linesville Park would be kept clear for emergency helicopter landings.

The 450 truck has new tires, and new headlights have been installed on the 650 plow truck.

Police committee chair Tim Janosco said that police academies are mandating ride-along programs for applicants. White Haven would like to participate. Interns are not allowed on hot calls, and they would be covered under the borough's insurance. Chief Tom Szoke is developing a policy.

The committee is looking at another candidate for a parttime officer.

The department will be taking part in an active shooter drill at Crestwood High School at the end of the year.

Finance chair Charlie Best reported that the borough has about \$33,000 in the general fund, plus \$15,358 for winter maintenance. It was decided to open a savings account for those funds, to go toward repairs to the 2001 truck, or possible replacement. Dorneman said a smaller truck would be adequate for the borough.

Prints have been received for phase 2 of work at the municipal building. Work will also be needed at the fire house, particularly to the windows. Water receipts were \$14,332.07 for November.

Bills of \$13,710 were approved.

Council president John Klem noted that this was the last meeting for council member Melanie Ross; he thanked her for her service and said it was a pleasure working with her. Next meeting will be the reorganization on Monday, January 4, at 5:30 p.m.

Penn Lake Council okays dam tax hike

At Penn Lake Park Borough council's last meeting of 2015, key business included passing a budget for 2016, and selecting a garbage hauler. Council member Jill Rosenstock announced that the borough will be getting \$13,749 in a reimbursement from PEMA for expenses from emergencies in 2014. She then tried to convince council to not raise taxes because this money is coming. Sadly, there was also a notice from PennDOT that an audit of Penn Lake's Liquid Fuels Fund found that the borough needed to reimburse the fund \$6,500 due to the work on Terrace Drive not meeting PennDOT's approval.

In voting, council was unanimous in moving \$6,500 from the General Fund into Liquid Fuels. Council split 3-1, Rosenstock opposed, on approving the 2016 budget with the tax increase. Member Rob Johnson was absent.

Voting was also 3-1, Rosenstock preferring the second bidder for one year, to accept a three-year contract with County Waste of Orwigsburg (successor to Kreitzer Sanitation), for \$121,800 (\$18,000 less than the second bidder). A discussion about problems with County Waste's pickups followed (missing homes, late pickup, leaving trash behind, not emptying cans, rude staff ...). Secretary Margo Beckerman noted that there are "people issues."

Council then voted to lower the 2016 trash fee from \$180 to \$175 – unanimously.



A Little Spanking Goes a Long Way: By New Years Day 1945, the Battle of the Bulge and the war in Europe by all accounts seemed to be won. The Germans' initial attack included 200,000 men, 340 tanks and 280 other tracked vehicles. German losses were

125,000 men killed, missing or wounded. For the Americans, 89.000 were casualties, including up 19,000 killed. In the Pacific, the Battle of Okinawa and the Battle of Luzon stood out as the other largest and bloodiest battles fought by the United States in World War II.

Confident of success, New Years Eve was a time to celebrate and many American, British and French forces did just that. Intelligence reports, coded radio traffic and even German POWs and defectors warned the Allied high command of a coming battle on New Years Day, Old Adolf was up to something and the holiday mood of the top echelon was not taking it seriously. In the allied camps and bases, the troops were celebrating the new year into the wee morning hours of January 1st, 1945. Emboldened by successes in the Ardennes since December 15th, Allied Commanders ignored the warnings and deviated from maintaining a High Alert.

Bodenplatte Operation would be the last large-scale strategic offensive mounted by the Luftwaffe during the war. On 1 January 1945 at 6:00 a.m., over 1000 Luftwaffe planes from all remaining fighter and bomber wings rose into the skies in Allied controlled Europe. This operation would attempt to destroy Allied air forces to allow German army forces to continue their offensive in Ardennes. Thousands of American, British and French soldiers were awakened by machine guns from the screaming Stukas, BF-109 fighters and ME-262 fighter jets attacking and strafing their breakfast tables. The German attack achieved total surprise.

The operation was initially planned for 16 December 1944 in support of the Battle of the Bulge and would have made a difference then. But it was delayed due to bad weather until New Years Day.

In spite of the careful planning, the Germans had big problems of their own. To keep the secrecy for the operation, German ground and sea forces had not been informed. This resulted in 1/3 of the aircraft being shot down from German friendly fire (346 in less than an hour). Although Germans achieved some surprise and tactical success, the operation was a failure.

A great number of Allied aircraft were destroyed on the ground. Allied aircrew casualties were quite small since most of the losses were empty planes on the ground. By 7:00 a.m., American losses totaled 305 aircraft destroyed and 190 damaged planes, and another 70 airborne fighters were shot down. Out of 1,035 German aircraft, the Luftwaffe lost more than 700 planes, with 143 pilots killed and missing, 70 captured and 21 wounded. Many of the German formation leaders lost were experienced, irreplaceable veterans. General Adolf Galland said, "We sacrificed our last substance, all is lost."

Only the P-51 Mustangs of the 352nd Fighter Group's 'Bluenosers' responded successfully as their hard nosed commanding officer ordered no drinking on New Years Eve and morning training at dawn. As they took off for training, they met hordes of German attacking aircraft thus they rightly earned a place in history for their accidental lightning response to the surprise attack on their airfield at Asch, Belgium. An American Sergeant's candied response to the press was censored but revealed at war's end: "What a way to wake up with a hangover, G-- d--m Jerry's machine guns scrambling our eggs."

The last major battles that followed were at the bridges on the borders of Germany. The same American Sergeant would again make the news in March 1945 when he walked up to a German boy shooting at him. The rifle was too large for the boy to balance for an aimed shot. Instead of killing him, he took the rifle from the 11 year old German boy soldier and threw it over a wall. He then spanked the boy over his knee and sent him home to survive the war. The same boy died of natural causes in 1983, a week after visiting with this man in Stuttgart who spanked him instead of killing him. They remained friends from war's end until their deaths. On this New Years Eve, may happiness and success bless us all.







Gas prices are great. We found \$2.13.9 in Wilkes-Barre on our Penguins trip.


We also tanked up on oil ahead of the coming cold snap at \$1.55 a gallon.

Steamtown looks forward to celebrating the centennial of the National Park Service and Steamtown National Historic Site's 30th anniversary in 2016. The park staff is planning a number of events and programs to help commemorate these milestone anniversaries. Come out and show their support of Steamtown whether on a fee free day, at one of planned events, or any other time throughout the



year," said Superintendent Debbie Conway.

Usually, Steamtown NHS has an entrance fee of \$7 per person; children 16 and under, with adults, are admitted free. The entrance fee waiver does not cover train rides or excursions, but includes the park visitor center and museum complex, which features a History, Roundhouse and Technology museums, plus a state-of-the-art digital Theater, which presents the park's 18-minute movie, "Steel and Steam." THIS WEEK'S ANSWERS

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2015 was a year for celebration and sorrow

There were times for celebration, and times for sorrow as we look back on the sports stories that shaped the local community during the past 12 months.

Several teams from Crestwood High School earned District 2 championship banners and carried their programs into the state tournament, and a number of Weatherly Area High School athletes put together outstanding individual performances in 2015.

It was also a year marked with tragedy, as Indy Car driver Justin Wilson lost his life in an accident at Pocono Raceway. Closer to home, White Haven's own Marty Mrozinski, who coached many local softball and baseball teams, also passed away suddenly in 2015, leaving a huge void as well.

As we flip the calendar to 2016 this week, let's take one more look back at the events and performances that were most memorable in 2015. The year started on the basketball floor, wrestling mat, the swimming pool and the ice as area athletes were wrapping up the 2014-15 winter season with a great deal of success.

The Crestwood boys basketball team needed a 63-53 overtime victory over arch-rival Hazleton Area to force a tie for the Wyoming Valley Conference Division I title, then beat the Cougars again nine days later in a special playoff, 52-38, to pocket the division championship for a second straight season. The Comets' Cole Wasco was named WVC Division I Most Valuable Player, and Mark Atherton was the division's Coach of the Year

The Crestwood girls, and namely Maddie Ritsick, were making headlines during the winter as well. The



junior forward scored a single-season school record 559 points, averaged an area-best 24.3 points per game, and scored her milestone 1,000th point before tearing up her knee in a plavoff win over Lake-Lehman. Ritsick earned co-Player of the Year honors in the WVC, and was named to the all-state team for a second straight year. She recently returned to the basketball court fully recovered and leading her team again, and is currently closing in on Diane Madl's all-time scoring record at Crestwood. The Lady Comets also had a change in coaches, as Pat Brogan resigned after two success-

ful seasons and was replaced by Ed Stepanski.

Crestwood wrestler Dan Ritz also made plenty of headlines, garnering a District 2 championship and a Northeast Regional runner-up medal



at 138 pounds en route to the state championships, where he finished eighth to end his stellar scholastic wrestling career on the medal stand in Hershey. "It was great just getting here. To get a medal is just icing on the cake, really," Ritz said afterward. On the ice, the Crestwood ice

hockey team captured its second straight Penguins Cup with a 7-0 shutout of Back Mountain for the Northeast

Pennsvlvania Scholastic Hockey League championship. Drew Bobynskyj had a four-point night, Stefan Krupski and Michael Thamert scored two goals apiece and Gavin Lewis posted 17 saves in goal for the Comets in their title game victory.

Crestwood, which won its sixth title since the league was formed in 1999, advanced to the Flvers Cup for the first time, a tournament that produces the state champion each year. Once there, the 19th- and lastseeded Comets proved their worth. The Comets opened the tournament by cruising past 14th seed Penncrest, 7-0. Two nights later, they stunned fourth-seeded Hershey 7-5 to advance to the quarterfinal round. Crestwood eventually fell to Garnet Valley in the quarterfinal round, but not before making school history in the process.

Meanwhile, two Weatherly Area swimmers earned top-10 finishes at the District 11 Championships even though the Wreckers do not field a swim team. Competing as independent swimmers, the Wreckers' Jacob Sirkot placed eighth in the 100 breaststroke (and 11th in the 200 individual medley) at the district meet, and teammate Keith Cullen was 10th in the 100 butterfly and 100 backstroke events.

In the spring, the Crestwood boys lacrosse team - led by Bobynskyj and Jay Popson - earned its firstever District 2 championship, beating league powerhouse Delaware Valley 6-5 in the semifinals and long-time nemesis Dallas 14-9 in the Back Mountain in the title game. But after downing Dallas 14-9 in May, the Comets lacrosse team was finally able to call itself a district champion.

"It feels great," Bobynskyj said. "After all the years of not being the best team in the conference and finally making it here to the top, there's nothing better."

The summer months were marred with tragedy at Pocono Raceway, where Verizon IndyCar Series driver Justin Wilson died from a head injury suffered in the August race. The 37-vear-old Wilson was hit in the head by a piece of debris that had broken off Sage Karam's car when Karam crashed into the outside wall in turn 1 on lap 180 of the 200-lap race. Wilson's car went out of control to the left and struck a wall on the inside of the track. He was flown to Lehigh Valley Hospital in Allentown, where remained in a coma before dying the following day. Wilson's death was the fifth fatality of a professional driver in the history of the track, according to Pocono Raceway.

Earlier in the summer, NASCAR racing legend Jeff Gordon - one of the all-time great racers at Pocono - made his last start at the 2.5-mile tri-oval. Gordon retired at the end of the season.

Also last summer, Adam Keselicka drew a bases-loaded walk to force in the winning run in the bottom of

10th inning the as Weatherly outlasted Butler Legion 9-8 to capture the Valley Junior by Steve Stallone, Sports Editor Babe Ruth 13-15 baseball championship for the second time in three seasons.

The fall sports season was indeed a memorable one for Crestwood teams. Crestwood's golf team used great balance to capture its third straight Wyoming Valley Conference Class AAA championship, edging perennial contender Coughlin 352-355 at Fox Hill Country Club. Coughlin's Ryan Keyes dominated the field with a round of 76 for medalist honors, but it was Crestwood's balance that clinched the title as John Hawley placed second overall with a round of 83, followed by teammates John McGroarty (87), Shane Angle (90) and Tyler Papura (92).

The Comets' boys soccer team was busy making history of its own, capturing the District 2 championship with a 1-0, double-overtime win over Coughlin in a match played at Lake-Lehman. Zach Metzger's game-winning goal - booted in after it bounced off teammate Jason Klusewitz's back - set off a wild celebration for the Comets, who received another standout performance in goal from Lance Lysiak. "Honestly, best feeling ever," stated Metzger, who said he never had a game-ending goal before that night.

Meanwhile, the Crestwood field hockey team was making its usual run to gold in the fall. The Comets led by their senior class - captured their fourth straight WVC and District 2 Class 2A championships, and reached the state semifinals before bowing out 3-2 against Twin Valley. Two of those seniors, Hannah Ackers and Elizabeth Dessoye, were named National Field Hockey Coaches Association All-Americans following the season.

In Weatherly, it was Jared Hinkle

who was making a name for himself. The senior had never before competed in cross country, but burst onto the scene and rewrote the Weatherly course record en route to a thirdplace finish in the District 11 Class A Championships and a berth in the state meet.

Classmate Jake Stover, meanwhile, led the Wrecker boys soccer team to a successful season and earned himself a spot on the Pottsville Republican's all-star team after scoring a team-leading 25 goals and notching four assists.

A number of Crestwood graduates enjoyed outstanding field hockey seasons in college this fall, none more than the foursome of Anna Dessoye, Jess Newak, Alexa Moran and Danielle DeSpirito. Dessove led Maryland to the Big Ten championship and was named All-Big Ten first team, while Newak was named to the Atlantic Coast Conference first team after leading Wake Forest to the ACC final. DeSpirito helped Ursinus to the NCAA Division III national semifinals, and Moran led West Chester to the NCAA Division II national semifinals.

And 18-year-old Crestwood graduate Marcus Joseph became the first Comet to sign a national letter of intent to play at the Division I level in ice hockey. He committed to Sacred Heart University for the 2017-18 season

As 2015 was winding down, tragedy hit the local community when Marty Mrozinski died suddenly. Mrozinski was preparing for his 13th season as Penn State Hazleton's softball coach after a number of coaching stints at Weatherly, Crestwood, MMI and Bishop Hafey in softball, girls basketball and baseball, But Mrozinski, whose 236 wins is a school record at Penn State Hazleton, was remembered as much for his kind heart as he was for his coaching success. "He was more of a mentor in life, not just softball," former Lady Lions softball player Alyssa Rodzewich said. "He was always there for you, whether it was to talk about boys, about classes, about professors or anything," added Erin Dougherty, another of Mrozinski's softball players at Penn State Hazleton and a Weatherly Area graduate. "He was a father figure to all of us."



White Haven native Rich Lipinski, Mrozinski's right-hand man at Penn State Hazleton and also at Bishop Hafey, was hired as interim coach for the Lady Lions for 2016. For all his coaching accomplishments and accolades, Lipinski said Mrozinski



never wanted the credit. "The most important thing to Marty was it was always about the girls," Lipinski said. "He would always say the girls win games and coaches lose them. That was Marty." "His legacy is huge at that school," added Dougherty. "It's going to be hard for them to play this season (but) Marty wouldn't want us to be sad. He would want his legacy to continue."
