White Haven Borough Council repealed an ordinance from 2002 that vacated part of the east end of Susquehanna Street during the April 25 meeting. The part of the street adjacent to the D\&L Trail parking lot was originally supposed to be used for a comfort station for the park. The Commonwealth did not follow through on those plans.

Following a public hearing with no comments, counci voted unanimously to repea the ordinance in its entirety.
Council member Bob Lamson requested that the solicitor send a letter to notify the state of this action. Atty. Sean Longren, who was filling in for Atty. Karpowich, will send a letter to Dave Madl of DNRC.

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## Veterans Corner

## Our friends across the southern border, what happened?

Between 1936 and 1942, Mexico's dictator was leaning toward siding with Germany, Italy and Japan. Germany offered to return Texas, New Mexico and Arizona to Mexico when it defeated the United States. Full support for war against the United States came from the Sinarquista movement, a loosely formed Nazi-styled party who originated in Spain's civil war. Sinarquist membership in Mexico numbered 500,000 in 1940 and was growing rapidly - many were trained soldiers.
War drums beat against the USA also from Mexico's sizable Italian expatriate community. The United States was informed of what may happen by British spies and started taking steps to defend against a German/Italian backed invasion from Mexico. This intensified as plans for the Japanese to land and occupy Alaska became known. A two-prong attack could have occurred early in the summer of 1942 while the USA was still not totally prepared for war.
American intelligence agencies were worried by the 1942 establishment by the Sinarquist of a military colony and port at Magdalen

Bay, on the coast of Baja California. Far enough removed from Mexican naval control but close enough to US territory to serve enemy interests, the concern was that the Sinarquist might allow Japanese use of the facility. The fear was not misplaced as Japan was attacking the United States as our government denied it. Japanese forces were landing in the Aleutians, and Japanese submarines were shelling oil refineries along the California coast. Japan sent over 9,000 balloon-bourn incendiary bombs, setting forest fires in Oregon state - anything was considered possible.
Then Hitler changed everything, just past 11:30 on the night of May 13th, 1942, a German U-boat fired torpedoes at a merchant ship off south Florida. The vessel was the "Potrero del Llano," of Mexican registry. And as the torpedoes struck, the thousands of tons of oil she was carrying exploded in a fireball that sparked Mexico's entry into World War II. Mexico broke off diplomatic relations with Germany, Italy and Japan following the sinking (The U-boat sinkings were part of Operation Drumbeat, a German submarine offensive which
targeted shipping using US East Coast ports). Germany responded nine days later by torpedoing a second Mexican oil tanker off the Florida Keys. Outraged, Mexico declared war against the Axis powers on May 28th and asked the USA to ally with them.
Over the next three-and-a-half years of war, the economic and military links forged between Mexico and the United States would define friendly relations across the Rio Grande for decades to come. Immigrant labor, bilateral trade, energy sharing and security co-operation are all modern-day issues first successfully confronted by the two neighbors as WW2 allies 60 years ago.
Mexico quickly began fulfilling its wartime commitment to America by providing tens of thousands of agricultural contract workers, tank-er-loads of oil and massive amounts of other crucial war materiel. President Franklin D. Roosevelt, recognizing the
need for US-Mexican security co-operation, used the FBI and various arms of military intelligence to infiltrate Sinarquist fundraising cells operating in the US and Mexico, destroying them.
Mexico's WW2 effort went beyond sniffing out spies; thousands of Mexicans served with US forces during the war, but brave Mexicans wanted the honor to carry their own flag into battle. It was decided that the military arm best equipped to carry the Mexican flag into battle was the Mexican Air Force, though they did not have one yet. By July 1944, the US had trained enough Mexican pilots to form three squadrons, one of which - "The Aztec Eagles" - was commissioned for active service in February, 1945. It saw action while attached to the USAAF Fifth Air Corps, flying Republic P-47 Thunderbolts out of Clark Field in the Philippines. Of the 31 Mexican pilots who flew in combat missions, five were
killed under the Mexican flag. It was the first time Mexican forces had ever set foot on foreign soil to wage war, and it hasn't happened since.
It showed the USA and Mexico could not only work together, but also be friendly and considerate.
Which makes you wonder what went wrong. That answer is crooked Mexican and American politics, itis all about the money now. The good Mexican and good American citizens who worked together for the betterment of all are gone, pushed aside by governments of greed and corruption who ignore the needs and freedoms their people.
Will it take another threat by a tyrannical out-of-control government to open everyone's eyes again? Corrupt establishment government officials continue destroying the will of the people on both sides of the border. What are "WE" the people going to do about it? Happy Cinco de Mayo to all.

200 people who turned out at the Weatherly Elementary School for a testimonial dinner honored the 66 year-old Senator Norman Koch, a Weatherly native, on Saturday night. Among the speakers who lauded Koch were Senator William Scott of Lansford, State Representative John "kke" Bonner of Summit Hill, and Judge Albert Heimbach of the Carbon County courts. Music for the occasion was provided by the Variety Boys (of Weatherly) under the direction of Louis Romano Sr. Weatherly
mayor Irvin Neifert declared the day "Norman H. Koch Day" in Weatherly. Toastmaster was Harrison Henritzy. Present for the evening were Koch and his wife, Adda, and two of the couple's daughters. ## Get creative at the Engine House <br> A summer arts and photography <br> Weaver will emphasize the use of <br> of a Ciba-Chrome print. This fina

program is being held on June 11 at the White Haven Area Community Library in White Haven. "Get Creative @ The Engine House" is the theme of the program with the 2016 focus titled Arts \& Photography Along the D\&L Trail. Co-sponsored by the library and the Delaware \& Lehigh Trail Alliance, the one day event will feature programs by three artists and one photographer from the Wyoming Valley arts community.
The art programs will offer instructive and interactive experiences led by Mary Beth Lesko, Susan Sponenberg, and Tim Weaver. The photography session will be led by Curtis Salonick.
Lesko's session, titled "Drawing Mother Nature," will demonstrate the use of colored pencils. Lesko holds an associate's degree in commercial art from Luzerne County Community College. She studied under Nancy Katchmer of Hazleton, who she describes as her mentor, and later studied with Georgiana Cray Bart of Wilkes-Barre. This talented sketcher first painted with oils and later moved on to watercolors and pastels. Her primary medium now is colored pencils. "They just felt good in my hands. Using pencils was very enlightening, as far as color and creating color, because they're semi-transparent, and when you layer the color, the nuances of color that come out are just spectacular. Creating color is what excites me about my work, so pencil worked beautifully. It's truly the medium of choice for me."
Sponenberg will introduce participants to oils in her session titled "Painting Woodland Wildlife." As a painter, she specializes in fox hunting, racing, and animal portraits. Her favorite medium is oil and her style is realism. An Associate member of the American Academy of Equine Art, her work can be seen in the Artful Framer, Chadds Ford Gallery, Damselfli Gallery, and Horse Unlimited. In 1996, he was elected to signature membership in the Pennsylvania En Plein Air Society. A resident of Drums, he has exhibited throughout the country and has taught classes and workshops in the NEPA, the Lehigh Valley, and New Jersey since 1992. He credits artists and instructors Tony van Hasselt, Judi Wagner, Edwin Havas, and Bill Grah for their influence on his style.
The photography class with Sa lonick is titled "Outdoor Photography Techniques." A self-taught freelance photographer, Salonick has always been fascinated by art, its creativity and discipline. His first success came with the development of a process where he would use litho film to mask certain areas
print he called a Litho-Chrome since it involved both litho film and Ciba -Chrome print material. The next, and more significant step came in August of 1989 when he happened upon an empty warehouse space. This space triggered a kind of metamorphosis in his work.

He went from color and nature to $4 " \times 5$ " and B\&W (using a cambo superwide with a 65 mm . lens) to the use of models and, at first, the creation of limited sets and props. The process developed over the years, using B\&W 4" x 5" duplicating film to transfer individual parts of an original negative in the creation of a multi-layered negative from which the final prints are made. The style that resulted he likes to refer to as Gothic Surrealism. Another important aspect of the process is the use of what he refers to as "screens". These are patterns found in nature or made

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by man that repeat a particular pattern. These are then combined, to some degree, in the final image.

Each session being held on June 11 will begin at the library's location at the Engine House at 99 Towanda Street, White Haven. Participants will then walk along the nearby D\&L Trail, part of the Delaware \& Lehigh National Heritage Corridor, and discover interesting sights to incorporate into their art and photography. An art show planned for the fall will
highlight the works created by the participants as well as the instructors.
