WASD lunch prices rising for 2017

During the May meeting of the Weatherly Area School Board, the board approved a 10¢ per lunch increase. Elementary/middle school lunch prices will be \$2.20, high school student will pay\$2.35, and adults \$3.10. This increase offers a guaranteed profit to the district of \$3,243.75 for the 2016-2017 school year.

The Personnel/Policy Committee disucssed changes to the lunch policy. Currently high school students are not allowed to charge a lunch or ala carte items. Administration asked the board to consider extending that policy to middle school. Some board members disagreed with that change suggesting instead the prohibition against charging a lunch be removed from the high school level. As a result of the questions raised, the policy was not presented to the board for reading and was tabled with continued discussion

expected when the Personnel/ Policy Committee meets again on August 3 at 6 p.m. before the 7 p.m. caucus meeting.

The Varsity Boys Baseball team parent group sought permission to erect a concession stand at the field. For the past few years, the parents have set up a table and sold refreshments from an uncovered location.

Spokesman Alan Knepper requested that the school give the group permission and asked if they could provide the stone foundation that will be needed. The group is seeking donations from other organizations, individuals and businesses to raise the needed \$2,270 for the purchase of the shed. Electricity will be secured using an extension of the service available at the district garage.

Superintendent Thomas McLaughlin said a property committee meeting would be needed to discuss this project. That meeting was held May 17, and following agreement that the group could seek the financial support needed for the building, the baseball parents are looking for donations.

The committee meeting on May 17 also addressed bus stop safety concerns raised by a parent during the May meeting.



Weatherly joins Council of Governments

During the Weatherly Borough Council meeting on Monday, May 16 in addition to the discussion regarding the Schwab School, council cast a unanimous vote on an ordinance to join the Carbon County Council of Governments. Borough manager Harold Pudliner sees the COG as a way to provide cost sharing and problem solving

for the municipalities that join and participate.

In other business, Council agreed unanimously to advertise for bids for the sale of the 2004 Blazer. They discussed whether to put the truck out for bid or to sell it for scrap. If any bids are received they will be opened during the caucus meeting scheduled for June 15.

Council also authorized the

borough manager to schedule meetings with Packer Township and a committee of council members to discuss the Fire Protection Agreement. Council members Norm Richie, Harold Farrow, Cecelia Gower and George Miller agreed to serve on the committee.

The next regular meeting will be held Monday, June 20 beginning at 7 p.m.

Residents were concerned about dragging the containers down long driveways, and damage to them if left close to the road.

Because County Waste accepts recycling, supervisors voted to discontinue to the recycling bins at the park. Cost for the bins had risen from \$100 a month to \$295 month. There was no dissatisfaction with the service from Solomon Brothers.

Supervisors also noted that they had met with the fire protection committee of Weatherly Borough, negotiating the fee for 2016. Suravicz emphasized that the township had to provide fire protection, and that the costs for Citizens Fire Co. hadve risen significantly over the years since the agreement was first put





in place. A figure has been proposed to the borough for a five-year contract.

Some residents questioned whether the township should look into fire protection from other municipalities. Supervisor Bill Swinesburg said that they were negotiating in good faith with Weatherly, but might go that route if an agreement cannot be reached. Any contracted company must be within a close distance.

Because Code Enforcement Officer Paul Lech has

not been attending meetings, and has not been in communication, supervisors voted to replace him. Frank Shor, a Weatherly resident who worked in the New York City Sherrif's Department as an under-deputy sherrif, was appointed to the post.

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Main Street sidewalk sales a possibility in White Haven

White Haven may be more welcoming of sidewalk sales if an ordinance amendment discussed at the May 23 council meeting is adopted. The measure presented by solicitor Don Karpowich would allow sidewalk sales and outdoor eating areas, as long as a 3' clear path is maintained, and all Americans with Disabilities Act quidelines are met.

As presented, the ordinance called for all equipment to be taken inside at night, or after the business closes. Some council members felt that was contrary to what council intended, and would be counterproductive. Council member Tim Janosco said that council's intent was "to

Council voted to hold a public hearing on the amendment at the beginning of the June 27 council meeting. Council member Clyde Morrison voted no.

A proposal to hold a Memorial Day parade was scrapped for 2016 because of insufficient planning time. There was much enthusiasm for the idea of the return of a Memorial Day parade, however, and Janosco was appointed to head a committee of community organizations and the borough to plan for 2017.

Engineer Don Totino reported that the Hemlock Street Park grant from DCNR was in place. The contractor was given notice to proceed beginning June 6, with 60 days to complete the job.

Bids will be sought for the repairs to the municipal building roof, to be awarded at the July meeting. An option for a rubber roof was included.

A storm drainage issue by PNC Bank is under study. A crushed line Should be replaced, but it may be possible to alleviate the situation with

an inlet box. Borough manager Linda Szoke noted that storm water pipes all over the borough are deteriorating, and they borough should look for grants to rehabilitate the system.

Council approved the concept of a town-wide yard sale in the borough on Labor Day weekend. Residents would pay \$5 to register and be included in advertising and maps. Ambulance volunteers

will sell ads to go on the map as a fundraiser. People from out of town will be able to set up at Lehigh Park for a fee. The first year, the sale may only be official on Saturday.

PA Rep. Gerald Mullery will hold office hours in the borough on the first and thrid Wednesday of each month.

\$54,135.90 was received from tax collector Kathy Oross.

Police Chief Tom Szoke reported that the Main Street cameras have been installed, and tickets are being issued for vehicles parked on Main Street in violation of the parking ordinance.

Present were council members Charlie Best, Janosco, John Klem, Lamson and Morrison; Joe Knowles and Rose Swerdon were absent. The next meeting is Monday, June 27, at 7 p.m.

Pens finally get their elusive fourth Stanley Cup

For Pittsburgh Penguins fans like myself, it's been a long wait. Thankfully, that wait is finally over. On Sunday night, the Pens finished off the Sharks in San Jose, 3-1, to capture their fourth Stanley Cup and first since 2009. In fact, Sunday marked the seventh anniversary - to the day - of the Pens' series win over the Detroit Red Wings, the last time they raised Lord Stanley's Cup to end a season

Following that win seven years ago, most of us felt that our Pens were in the midst of building a dynasty with young stars Sydney Crosby and Evgeni Malkin firing in goals and Marc-Andre Fleury protecting the net. For one reason or another, that never happened. Some key injuries plagued them in some seasons, and less-than-stellar play in others led to six straight exits from the postseason without a championship. Until Sunday.

Thanks to a new coach promoted from Wilkes-Barre/ Scranton in mid-December (Mike Sullivan) and a renewed sense of urgency, the Penguins played their best hockey after the calendar flipped to 2016. Acquiring forward Phil Kessel was huge, as he had a tremendous postseason. The play of defensemen like Kris Letang and Olli Maatta, and forwards like Bryan Rust and Tom Kuhnhackl was incredible. And Crosby and Malkin were their steady selves throughout much of the playoffs.

But, in my mind, the real hero to this championship story was rookie goaltender Matt Murray. Once the starting goalie with the Wilkes-Barre/Scranton Penguins of the AHL, Murray came up huge late in the

season when Fleury suffered a concussion and was forced out of action. Even when Fleury was able to return during the postseason, he was unable to unseat the red-hot Murray. The 22 year-old won 15 playoff games in net, tying a rookie record and powering the Penguins to the Cup. Although Crosby was presented with the Conn Smythe trophy as the playoff MVP, it could have and probably should have gone to Murray.

With their core players all 30 or younger, and with many of their other key players younger still, the Penguins appear to have all the pieces in place to make several more runs at the Cup with this group. That's what they were saying seven years ago, however.

Right now, I'm not worried about what happens next season or seven seasons from now. All I'm thinking is the Cup is back in Pittsburgh, in what I regard as the City of Champi-

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
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Mullery lessens penalty for hunters

State Representative Gerald Mullery (D-Luzerne) introduced legislation to significantly lessen the penalty for hunters who forget their license when they go into the woods.

House Bill 2110 would reduce to \$50 the penalty for people who have a hunting license but simply forget to bring it with them. Currently, the code treats hunting without buving a license and hunting but forgetting to bring a

license as the same, with a fine of no less than \$250 and no more than \$500.

"While it is important for a hunter to have their license on them while in the woods, sometimes human nature gets the best of them and they just forget and leave it either at home or in their vehicle," Mullery said. "My legislation would make the punishment less harsh for forgetfulness, which occasionally happens to people."

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






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
