### **Concert series brings it to the borough**

"[The Borough should] help the Sherman [Theater] who have invested a lot of time and money into our little borough," urged Mount Pocono Mayor Fred Courtright as council reviewed the group's request at the June 6 Mount Pocono meeting for banner advertising for August 20's Beerfest across Route 611.

Considering that a series of concert events to be held on the grounds of Pocono Mountain Volunteer Fire Company this summer will be beneficial to businesses in the borough, it was agreed to allow the signage to be in place August 5 to 22. A \$100 fee for setup by the borough is expected.

Public inquiry over further payment to the municipality was met by an explanation of the plus side to a municipality hosting such events. Keith Transue noted, "It's going to be something positive for the borough," suggesting people traveling through will stay in the area and go to restaurants. The concerts will provide an on-the-plateau option for entertainment. "It's good music and it's a good fit for us," stated Mayor Courtright.

Council recognized community members involved with this year's Joe Battisto Cleanup Days in May, who collected over 100 bags of garbage over the two day span. The group applauded pickup participants including Mayor Courtright, Ronald Degroat, Brant Degroat, Keith Transue, Mary Degroat, Cordell Degroat, Briar Degroat, Alexzanderick Newport, Elizabeth Transue, Jacob Transue and Spencer Transue, Declan Courtright, Rose Mercedes Courtright, Marlin Baez, Rafael Baez, Justin Ruiz, Charles Smith, and Thomas Muelle.

Sell or sit on was the mixed opinion of council as solicitor Jim Fareri opened sealed bids for the sale of two properties. Suggestions included further research into property value, and other borough uses. Transue argued, "We're out of room to store the stuff and our stuff is getting ruined," asking if truck equipment parking could be considered for the site. By a 4-2 vote, a Fork Street parcel was awarded on Dorian Bohdal's \$10,000 offer. Transue and Mike Oser were opposed.

Yoni Ramirez' offer of \$1,500 was accepted for the Timberbrook Terrace site, which is considered wetlands. Mayor Courtright cast the deciding vote, with Transue, Oser and Claudette Williams opposing the sale, and Donna Casole, Karl Davis, and Francis O'Boyle in favor.

Karl Davis encouraged borough residents to attend Pocono Mountain Public Library events and fundraisers, "even though we could not raise up the taxes to assist them."

Bills totaling \$1,456,617.95 were approved as uncertainty with municipal building ramp concrete repairs continues to have council disagreeing with a March 2016 to March 2017 warranty proposed by Potcher Construction. As winter weather work seemed inappropriate for pouring the mix, many believe final payment of \$10,164 should be held until an adequate assurance agreement can be reached. Transue reported a meeting with the contractor has yet to produce acceptable terms.

# **Clymer shares library logistics with Tunkhannock Twp.**

"2015 was a great year for us," began Clymer Library director Laura Laspee. She presented the library's year in review, joined by board of trustees vice president Terry Staph, during Tunkhannock Township Supervisors' June 8 meeting. Reporting nearly 33,000 visits with educational programs topping over 5,050 participants, she applauded a team comprised of staff and volunteers for the feat favoring fiscal responsibility.

The value of about \$50,000 in "free service," coupled with a variety of services including computers, Wi-Fi and more, makes the Pocono Pines site "more of a community center." A word of thanks was also

given to all who provide operational revenue—from state and county aid, to donors and taxpayers, with the municipality joining neighboring Tobyhanna Township in collecting Library Tax revenue.

Steve Malaico was appointed supervisor to complete Joseph Warriner's term after his recent death.

In other business, troublesome trees are threatening roadway safety. Supervisors turned toward the Bethlehem Water Authority. As responsibility for trees falls upon the property owner, the group agreed to "give notice" to the Authority of the need to "alleviate the hazard."

Providing a new name of "Tunkhannock Preserve" or keeping "Fern Ridge Preserve" was the question discussed, as dog park progress continues. While supervisors were agreeable to signage for the pup play area, a decision on the overall name was not made.

Zoning officer Kate Lambert told of Chris Warriner and the Blakeslee Rotary Club's on-

going pursuit stating, "It's something her father [Joe Warriner] wanted."

Having had enough of a cumbersome lending process that would tack on over \$14,500 in fees over a five year payback at an interest rate of 2.89%, supervisors agreed with secretary/treasurer Tina Kernan's suggestion to cancel the bank loan for a 2016 Freightliner truck and make the complete purchase, \$182,874, out of Capital Reserves.

A Safety Committee was formed to cut 5% off township

annual insurance costs.

May income reported was \$637,931.34 with \$87,921.34 expenses, leaving \$1,246,979.89 in the General Fund. Current and interim bills of \$66,120.30 were approved.
