## From The Weatherly Herald,

 June 30, 1977Karen Zeigler, a second grader at St. Nicholas School in Weatherly was a winner of the conservation poster contest sponsored by the Carbon County Conservation District.

The Carbon County Commissioners are looking into the cost of the second power line that connects to the Carbon County Home. There is a monthly payment of $\$ 731$ to cover the cost of building and maintaining the line. The borough has proposed that the county buy the line, to relieve the borough of the responsibility (and the county of the monthly payment).

## From The Journal-Herald June 20, 1985

Erv Carter, Jr. of White Haven was reappointed by the Crestwood School Board to be head boys' varsity basketball coach at Crestwood High School for the 1985-86 school year. Carter, an employee of White Haven Center, took on the job at the last minute last year when former coach Don Zampetti resigned at the beginning of the season as part of an ongoing contract dispute between Crestwood teachers and the School District. It was noted that the boys were "much improved" and played very well under Carter's direction last season.
At that same meeting, school board director Louise Phipps was ousted as secretary, and replaced with director Emilia Kramer on a vote of 4-3. Kramer had been the chief negotiator for the school board during the prolonged teachers' contract dispute.
After the board approved sabbatical leaves for two teachers for the 1985-86
school year, they voted to furlough two other teachers effective August 31 due to a decline in enrollment. The two were chosen on the basis of seniority.

The White Haven Ambulance's Ladies Auxiliary will host a bake sale fundraiser at the White Haven Thriftway on July 6 starting at 10 a.m. The Auxiliary meets on the first Tuesday of each month at 7 p.m. in the community room at First Eastern Bank.

Weatherly Borough, at their council meeting, authorized a Washington D.C. law firm to represent it at a hearing before the Federal Energy Commission about the Francis Walter Dam hydroelectric project. Cost was not to exceed $\$ 5,000$.
At that same meeting, it was reported that natural streams were not filling the Eurana Park pool this spring, and if that doesn't change by June 22, water from fire hydrants could be used. The idea of using the old Weatherly Water Co. system was suggested by installing a fire hydrant at the bottom of Buck Mountain, then stretching a temporary pipe to the pool. That system could be kept and used for fighting fires in the future.

Officials resist President's order to half staff American flags
Alabama counties and many others will not lower flags for Orlando's terror attack victims. Tucker Dorsey, chairman of the Baldwin County Commission, said he had the right to make the decision according to the U.S. Flag Code. "Once again I have to copy this post regarding lowering the flags. Another follower of Islam decided
to shoot up a bunch of innocents in a place where they didn't have the chance to defend themselves or flee."
When are we going to acknowledge the truth? When will we stop the PC and identify the enemy?
Dorsey added that according to the Flag Code, "Lowering the flags to half-staff after a terrorist event is not a valid circumstance or memorial... I realize that the President and Governor may make the order, but I believe and interpret their order inconsistent with the adopted flag code. When the flag is at half-staff, our country's head is figuratively held low, and quite frankly, I am not willing to hang my head down because of a terrorist attack against our people. I am not willing to hang my head down because of evil. We need more than a gesture as a response. I want us, as Americans, to stand tall, courageously, and fight back against the forces of evil, and let's fight like we intend to win."
Dorsey's position was echoed nationally with many
organizations not half staffing our colors. In addition, many veteran organizations colors remained at full staff citing similar reasons.
U.S. Code Title 4's directions on how the flag is to be displayed states, "By order of the President, the flag shall be flown at half-staff upon the death of principal figures of the United States Government and the Governor of a state, territory, or possession, as a mark of respect to their memory. In the event of the death of other officials or foreign dignitaries, the flag is to be displayed at hall-staff according to Presidential instructions or orders, or in accordance with recognized customs or practices not inconsistent with law. In the event of the death of a present
or former official of the government of any state, territory, or possession of the United States or the death of a member of the Armed Forces from (these same places), the Governor of (those places) may proclaim that the National flag shall be flown at half-staff.
"When the Governor of a State, territory, or possession, or the Mayor of the District of Columbia, issues a proclamation under the preceding sentence that the National flag be flown at half-staff (in those places) because of the death of a member of the Armed Forces, the National flag flown at any Federal installation or facility in the area covered by that proclamation shall be flown at half-staff consistent with that proclamation."

# Local legislators support bi-partisan pension reform 

 Mullery votes in favor of pension reform billState Representative Gerald Mullery (D-Luzerne) voted in favor of a pension reform bill that maintains benefits for current public employees and retirees while changing the pension structure for most future state and school employees.
"Pennsylvanians have been demanding the General Assembly address the state's
public pension challenges and I feel this bill is a step forward," Mullery said. "This bill will save nearly $\$ 6$ billion in future pension costs.
"I believe this bipartisan compromise is a vast improvement on the approach of previous years. While this action is not linked to the budget, it moves us closer to being able to focus on crafting
a balanced state budget that invests properly in education and begins to fix our deficit."
The bill (S.B. 1071), which was amended in the House, would shift some financial risk away from taxpayers and reduce future pension costs while protecting retirement security for current employees and those who are already retired.

## Heffley praises historic reform

State Representative Doyle Heffley ( R -Carbon) issued the following statement after the House voted 136-59 to pass a historic pension reform bill:
"Today, we took an important step toward addressing Pennsylvania's pension crisis. This legislation provides critical reform to address our $\$ 56$ billion pension debt without impacting current employees
or retirees. The bipartisan nature of this vote signifies the level of consensus arrived by members of this chamber. I hope this bill is promptly passed by the Senate so we are able to move the Commonwealth into a period of increased economic stability."
The bill now moves to the Senate for consideration.
