## Grant to renovate White Haven municipal building

White Haven Borough is one of 12 communities in the legislative district served by State Rep. Gerald Mullery to receive part of nearly \$3.5 million in grants announced by the Commonwealth Financing Authority.

"Today's investments approved by the CFA will prove to be beneficial to Luzerne County," Mullery said. "The scope of the projects is vast, but they help to enhance the quality of life for our residents and visitors."

White Haven's grant of \$184,000 will be used to complete renovations to the White Haven Municipal Building, including a new roof for the structure.

Other grants in the district include:

 \$40,073 for improvements to the Newport Township Community Park walking trail:  \$75,000 for improvements at Plymouth's John Mergo Community Park;

## **Editorial**

## Barriers make I-80 safer

Another deadly crash on Interstate 80 reminds us that the road could be a LOT safer for regular users.

What we know is that at about 6 a.m. on June 28, a driver of a car with New Jersey plates heading west lost control and drove his car off the road. The car went through the median and ended up going westbound in the eastbound lanes, facing heavy traffic. His car hit/was hit by a tractor-trailer, and he was thrown from the car and died.

That the driver could drive through the median and onto the oncoming lanes is a HUGE concern. This could have been much worse.

We urge PennDOT to put barriers in place in these medians to give out-of-control vehicles a life-saving stop, and to keep opposing traffic from the chance this will happen again.

## From the Archives

## From *The Weatherly Herald,* July 7, 1977

On the front page of the newspaper is a photo of the undefeated Weatherly Little League champs, Hazleton National Bank. The team won all 12 of their games, winning both the first and second half of the season. The team played in jerseys that say "Hazelton" in big letters, with National Bank (spelled correctly) underneath.

The front page also features a Letter to the Editor complaining about the 7.5 mill tax increase from the Weatherly Area School Board. On the back page is a story of the meeting that raised the taxes on a vote of 4 to 2, with three members absent. The board blamed the tax hike on a reduction of state subsidies. rising salaries, increased enrollment, and inflation. Residents at the meeting asked for reductions in the athletic program, particularly the football program "which could save a lot of money." Citizens were invited to make specific suggestions on where to cut programs and expenses. The board did cut utility expenses, and a janitor position. It was also noted that contract negotiations with the district's teachers were underway.

A photo on page 2 shows Robin L. Richardson of White Haven, who has become engaged to David Novitsky of Weatherly. Richardson is employed as a secretary for Wilmot Engineering Co. in White Haven. Novitsky is to graduate from East Stroudsburg State College, where he is majoring in health and physical education. No date has been set for the wedding.

Last week, a six-month project to demolish all of the existing buildings at the former Carbon County Home at Laurytown was started by the John Gentile firm. The three-story administration building is already down, and the chapel has been leveled. Next down was the "Mystery Building" as it had come to be known – the facility's utility building.

Weatherwood had a visit from seven executives of the Honeywell Corporation to examine the new Delta 1000 Energy Management System installed there. Andrew Tuzinski, County Home administrator, told Carbon County Commissioners that the system has "excellent performance" and that the executives flew in to this area for the visit via private jet. It is estimated that the system has so

far saved the county \$40,000 in the past six months. The system itself cost \$64,000.

The Weatherly 4-H Horse and Pony Club sponsors an open horse show at the Double H in Packer Township on July 10.

Weatherly Police report arresting three local men on fireworks law violations.

A new singles category for men 60 years and older has been added to the Carbon County Tennis Tournament, to be held from this Saturday through August 4 at county playgrounds. The finals are scheduled for August 6 at the Maple Tree Inn Tennis Club near Lehighton.

# Rep. Mullery supports PA budget

State Rep. Gerald Mullery, D-Luzerne, supported passage of a state budget plan that increases education funding and expands efforts to fight our commonwealth's growing opioid addiction crisis. "This plan isn't perfect, but it provides much needed education funding, something our school districts have been anticipating for years," Mullery said. "The budget is on-time and doesn't increase broadbased taxes."

Senate Bill 1073 includes a \$250 million increase for pre-K through 12 education funding, including \$200 million for K-12, \$30 million for pre-K and Head Start, and a \$20 million increase for special education. According to information provided by the House Appropriations Committee Democratic staff, Mullery said school districts in his 119th Legislative District are slated to receive substantial increases.

Mullery said the bill also provides funding for three additional Pennsylvania State Police cadet classes; transfers millions from the Oil and Gas Fund to the General Fund to give money to conservation programs and dedicates \$15 million to combat

heroin and opioid addiction, including funds for emergency addiction treatment and behavioral health services.

"This funding would help my district put more patrols in municipalities that don't have local police," Mullery said. "The \$15 million allocated to combat the heroin and opioid epidemic is crucial for so many families that have loved ones dealing with this overwhelming problem."

The bill is now headed to Gov. Tom Wolf's desk.

## Veterans Corner by John Kearns

THE FINEST HOURS: Of those who serve of our military services, the US Coast Guard grants more authority and trust to its younger members than all others. On a typical rescue station the Officer of the Day is an E-4 or E-5 most likely 20 to 24 years old, who has enlisted for four years and has already qualified in boat rescue expertise, firearms, law enforcement training, first aid, CPR and to act in the Position of OOD, making life and death decisions. The station is commanded by an E-7-8 or E-9 Chief Boatswains Mate.

If you ask a fireman, police officer or rescue squad member what RESCUE means, I am sure all will agree that rescue of another human in a life threatening situation is the word that scrubs common sense, abolishes reason,

wipes out calculation and leaves nothing but courage and a refusal to quit.

The film The Finest Hours. now available on DVD, brings back a few memories. You have to think a moment that a steel ship, 1,000 or more feet long, is in trouble in a storm. The wind is howling, waves are coming over the top of the outer break wall and even the lighthouse is submerged by each passing wave. You look at your 36' or 44' boat and understand you have to take it out there to rescue those souls before the wind and waves kill all onboard. You look at your crew whose motto is: We have to go out, but we don't have to come back! You have to try your best.

Hundreds of young Coasties have faced that decision, including myself. Simple, sen-

sible seamanship would have dictated a prompt return to the station. A tiny craft versus the vast and rampaging sea. But you push the throttles ahead and go in harm's way, knowing it may your last night on earth.

The movie illuminates the dangers of these rescues that occur all around our coasts and in the Great Lakes annually. Rescue! No other word so illuminates the courage and selflessness of men and women to risk all that others may live.

On the night of February 18, 1952, a violent Nor'easter slammed 70' waves into two tankers at sea. One, The Pendleton, sent out a distress call before she broke up with 33 men freezing and clinging to the sinking stern section, now drifting helplessly at sea. The Coast Guard station

had picked up The Pendleton on radar and was watching the two sections of the ship. Larger cutters and tugs better able to cope with the merciless sea were fighting their way there, but with no hope of arriving in time.

Against orders and wisdom, Bernard Webber, Boatswain's mate, and a crew of three decided to respond using their rescue craft, the motor lifeboat CG 36500. They decided to go not expecting to get to the shipwreck in time, not expecting to rescue anyone. If they did, they would not make it back over the perilous bar and towering breaking waves ... They did not expect to survive. Crossing the bar, the little boat was pounded by a huge waves tearing away rescue equipment and their compass ... the one piece of equipment needed to find the tanker then find their way back. By chance they found the stricken ship. Of 33 men, 32 were saved. This left four Coast Guardsmen and 32 safe tanker crewmen on a valiant 36' boat designed to hold 12, with no compass to lead them home. The Coxswain said: Our Lord had a hand on the tiller that night as they found the entrance to the harbor itself, made it over the bar, made it safe to the pier.

This is why our soldiers and Marines risk themselves to rescue a wounded comrade and why our first responders and police do not hesitate. When faced with the challenge of saving a life, you have to go out, but you don't have to come back. The movie honors all who risk all for those they serve.

## From *The Journal-Herald,* July 3, 1985

The Crestwood School Board dropped a proposed three-mill property tax increase from its final 1985 budget. The millage will remain the lowest of all the Luzerne County school districts. The total budget for '85-'86 is \$9,038,828. A list of 200 graduates of the Class of 1985 was approved. The board authorized taking a tax anticipation loan from First Eastern Bank of \$2 million.

The Weatherly Area School Board approved a budget of \$3,029,897 for the '85-'86 school year, with no increase in taxes. The board exempted property at 106 Carbon St. in Weatherly from taxes for the years 1981 to 1984. This is the former A&P Market building, now scheduled for demolition.

The White Haven Fire Co. #1 will not hold its monthly breakfast due to the Fireman's Carnival.



- \$1 million for the extension of Hazle Township Boulevard:
- \$673,000 for the acquisition and demolition of properties in Nanticoke City's downtown corridor;
- \$85,000 for upgrades of the Askam Borehole Mine Drainage Treatment System;
- \$505,000 for the Lower South Valley COG to purchase road restoration and construction equipment;
- \$241,351 to excavate and resurface borough streets in Plymouth;
- \$500,000 to construct a new municipal complex in Freeland;
- \$200,000 to excavate and

- resurface township roads in Rice Township;
- \$250,000 to construct a pole barn in Newport Township to store township and COG equipment; and
- \$35,000 for improvements at the West Hazleton Little League complex.

The CFA was established in 2004 as an independent agency of the Department of Community and Economic Development to administer Pennsylvania's economic stimulus packages. The CFA holds fiduciary responsibility over the funding of programs and investments in Pennsylvania's economic growth. The CFA consists of seven board members: four legislative appointees and the secretaries of DCED, the Office of the Budget and Department of Banking.



## PennDOT Opens New Baddick Memorial Bridge in Jim Thorpe

The Pennsylvania Department of Transportation last Friday opened the PA 903

Sgt. Andrew J. "AJ" Baddick Bridge over the Lehigh River, Lehigh Canal, Reading Blue



Mountain Northern Railroad and Norfolk Southern Railroad in Jim Thorpe Borough.

PennDOT District Executive Michael W. Rebert was joined by elected officials to officially cut the ribbon to open the new bridge. Officials from Jim Thorpe Borough and the business community also participated in the event.

"We are excited to cut the ribbon on perhaps the most significant transportation project in Carbon County in decades," Rebert said. "We appreciate the patience of the legislators, local officials and business owners during this project. It is an honor to open this magnificent struc-

ture with them here today."

Work began in March 2014 to replace the structurally deficient PA 903 Bridge. The project involves replacing the existing structurally deficient five-span steel girder bridge with a four-span continuous steel plate girder bridge.

The new bridge is on a new alignment approximately 940 feet upstream from the existing bridge and includes a new signalized intersection at the relocated intersection of PA 903 and US 209.

Also during construction crews reconstructed and widened US 209 between Liberty and Packer Hill roads, built retaining walls, removed the existing PA 903 Bridge and performed other miscellaneous construction.

Ongoing work will include demolishing the old PA 903 Bridge, establishing vegetation and other miscellaneous work.

Allan A. Myers, LP of Worcester, Pa. is the general contractor on the \$28,183,312 project.

The old PA 903 Bridge was constructed in 1953 and rehabilitated in 1976. It is 613 feet long and 27 feet wide. The new bridge is 961 feet long and 57 feet 8 inches wide. This section of PA 903 has an average daily traffic volume of 9.681 vehicles.





Siegel resigned after two seasons with the Comets, noting his drive from Tunkhannock each day helped play into the decision to step down.




