Charles Palermo, who is heading up the committee to save the Schwab School, spoke to the Weatherly Borough Council during their July 26 meeting, telling them of the efforts so far.

A public meeting of the Charles M. Schwab School Restoration Project will be held on Tuesday, August 16 at 6:30 p.m. at the Eurana Park bandshell. Palermo asked people to please consider attending to learn more about how everyone's help will be utilized to accomplish this undertaking.

Palermo reported to council that 501.c.3 status is being sought. He also noted that board members toured the structure recently and are quite confident that an offer can be made for the purchase of the building.

A pledge letter is going out with the utility bills this month and the Weatherly Area High School Alumni Association has agreed to distribute that pledge request to their membership as well, many of whom no longer reside within the borough.

Palermo thanked Phil Jeffries for his constant effort to keep people informed via the Save our School Facebook page.

He also reported that Dawn Bellizia, another committee member and owner of Dawn's Vinyl Designs, has a large number of items available for sale at her Carbon Street shop. Proceeds from the sale of these items will go toward the Save our School effort.

Editorial

Keep RR crossing open

White Haven Borough Council wisely rejected a proposed "solution" by the Reading, Blue Mountain & Northern Railroad to the atrocious condition of the railroad crossing at Northumberland Street. At their July meeting, council voted to reject a proposal to permanently close the crossing for a one-time payment of \$27.500.

It wouldn't matter if the payment were 10 times that much—the answer should still be no. Closing that crossing would leave the borough with only one good way to cross the tracks. Main Street would be separated from the rest of the community if the crossing at Berwick Street became blocked. The community's fire and emergency vehicles would be cut off from the town's business district. While light traffic could still use the underpass on Susquehanna Street, large vehicles like fire engines or delivery trucks could not.

Because PA Route 940 carries a moderate volume of traffic most days, and a very high volume when there is an incident on Interstate 80, the Susquehanna Street route could not handle that volume safely.

Keep the crossing open. And it's past time to upgrade the Northumberland Street crossing. Keep White Haven safe.


Henrietta is survived by her two grandchildren, Barry and Molly; and three great-grandchildren.

thing for everyone but something different to everyone," she stated regarding a question about Homeowners Association participation.

Calling Kidder a "borderline township in Carbon County," supervisor Barbara Franzosa concluded "This crew has done so much to bring events up here to us."

An woman addressed supervisors emotionally pleading for township intervention in the ongoing investigation involving an altercation at a local restaurant. Expressing frustration over the time it has taken to investigate a May 2015 parking lot incident that included her then

fiancé and friends with another group that left her now husband recovering from physical disabilities including visual impairment, she asked for "followup" assistance with Kidder Police Department.

LaFond urged her to leave a copy of the letter detailing the concerns for board review and discussion with Police Chief Matt Kuzma, who was absent from the meeting. He added that no comment would be made regarding the ongoing investigation.

Bills totaling \$175,629.12, that included \$50,000 to Albrightsville Volunteer Fire Company for airbags, were approved for payment.

Supervisors LaFond, Bruce Berger, Thomas Bradley, Franzosa, and Frank Pieri, along with business manager LIsa Klem, secretary/treasurer Suzanne Brooks, solicitor Dan Miscavige and approximately 30 members of the public were present.

The production style is considered "Extreme Shakespeare"—one that is rehearsed and performed akin to the way that Shakespeare's actors would have: actors arrive with their lines learned, rehearse on their own, wear what they can find, and

open in a matter of days. No director, the position didn't exist in Shakespeare's time, and no designers.

King Ferdinand of Navarre, played by Spencer Plachy, has issued a decree that he will give up women and love in pursuit of academic rigor, convincing three of his lords to join him. His plans are compromised when the beautiful and intellectual Princess of France is sent by her father to negotiate a debt, bringing an entourage of equally smart lady friends.

PSF veteran and Emmy nominee Marnie Schulenburg portrays the Princess and her real-life husband Zack Robidas plays the role of Berowne, one of the lords. The cast also features Mattie Hawkinson as the quick-witted Rosaline. Anthony Lawton joins the cast as Don Adriano de Armado, a Spaniard, as well as Christopher Patrick Mullen, who plays Costard, the clown. PSF veteran actor Wayne S. Turney plays Boyet, the ladies' advisor and mes-

senger. Peter Schmitz rounds out the cast as Holofernes, the snobbish schoolmaster.

Savoring Shakespeare, a specialty dinner themed for the production, will offer a behind-the-scenes discussion on August 6 and 7 at 5 p.m. An informal talkback with the cast will take place after the show on August 4.

In addition, prior to every performance, a free "prologue" with a member of the PSF staff provides insights into the play in an informal setting, 45 minutes before curtain in the theatre.

Also running are "The Little Mermaid" (through August 6); "The Taming of the Shrew" (through Aug. 7); "Blithe Spirit" (through Aug. 7); and "Shakespeare for Kids" (July 27-Aug 6). "West Side Story" and "Julius Caesar" have closed.

Kathleen Kund Nolan and Timothy E. Nolan are serving as season sponsors for the third time in the Festival's 25-year history. Associate season sponsors are the Harry C. Trexler Trust, Linda Lapos and Paul Wirth, Dr. James and Penny Pantano and the Szarko Family. The season media sponsor is The Morning Call.


