# Zaremba resigns as WASD principal

Amanda Zaremba submitted her resignation as Weatherly Area School District high school and middle school principal on Friday, September 2. An advertisement seeking a replacement appeared in *The Standard-Speaker* on September 3.

Reportedly, Zaremba's last day for the district will be September 16, after which time she will return to her former employer, BHA (Behavioral Health Associates). Zaremba was hired as high school principal in March, 2016, following the resignation of Stu Tripler, at a salary of \$80,000. She was also assigned as principal of the middle school for the current school year.

It was unclear at press time how those job duties would be divided. Calls Tuesday afternoon to school board president Girard Fewins and superintendent Thomas Mc-Laughlin were not returned.

WHITE HAVEN BOROUGH'S first-ever townwide Yard Sale took place on Saturday, and drew a lot of interest. The White Haven Ambulance raised close to \$500 in advertising sales on the map published last week in *The Journal-Herald;* all proceeds from those sales went to the squad. Renninger, from Mountain Top, told the group he has become a speaker, on college campuses and in the community, on the warning signs of domestic violence. Then he explained why.

On June 22, 2009, Renninger found the body of his daughter, Rebecca, shown at right in a modeling photo, in the basement of her home, killed by a gunshot to the head. He had been concerned when she had not

called or visited on Father's Day, and went to find out why.

What he found horrified him, but it did not shock him. Renninger outlined the signs that in hindsight pointed toward a violent outline from the time Rebecca started dating Brian while she was a senior at Crestwood High School. He isolated her from her family, hit her, and convinced her to drop out of school. Despite problems, they married in 2005.

Eventually, Rebecca found a way out and got a job. She moved in with friend, returned to school, and even started modeling. The future looked bright.

Although he had another girlfriend, Brian would not let go. He sabotaged her car, then lured her to the house, telling her he was replacing it for her. Instead, he shot her, then fled to California with a buddy. He was apprehended, but let out on bail. The investigation took almost a year, and when the DA filed charges and police were sent to pick him up, he committed suicide.

Renninger said from that point on, it was his mission to educate young people about dating abuse, and bullying in high school. "Girls don't know the danger signs," he said, and neither do parents

To raise awareness, he holds a concert each year at King's Pizza in Mountain Top. He speaks wherever he can, works with agencies like the Victims Resource Center, and sells Don't Hit Me buttons, \$1 each, with proceeds going toward domestic violence prevention.

Attending with Renninger was his friend Pat Rushton of the Victims Resource Center for Carbon, Luzerne and Wyoming Counties. He described resources available to victims, and suggested

that the most effective way to prevent domestic violence is to speak up against jokes and comments that seem to excuse domestic violence or portray it as funny. The joke teller may not be an abuser, but someone who hears the comment may preceive it as justification for violence.

Questions and comments revealed both the complexity of the issue, and the degree of concern it generates. Lions will continue to explore the topic, and look for ways to help.

# BISMARCK'S SISTER AND THE FROGMEN:

By fall of 1943, the Allies were making major strides to defeat Germany and the AXIS powers. Everyone celebrated the sinking of the Battleship Bismarck though it took the whole of the British Navy to do so.

There was little knowledge of the Battleship Tirpitz, its sister. The Tirpitz remained a grave danger to the convoys while anchored safely in a Norwegian fiord surrounded by high mountains bristling with anti-aircraft guns, plus her own arsenal. So no aircraft could get near the ship.

Any British ship thinking to attack had to first face the hidden artillery surrounding the entrance, then the potent 16-inch guns of the Tirpitz, while in a narrow channel with no room to maneuver. And sailing with the Battleship Scharnhorst and heavy cruiser Lützow, the Tirpitz

remained a dangerous threat to the North Atlantic and Arctic convoys.

To Winston Churchill, this was a painful thorn in his side. The Tirpitz had to be put out of action. All he was told it by his Naval advisors was that it was impossible to attack. At the boiling point, he called his staff for a meeting, then opened the meeting with the scolding saying, "It seems very discreditable that the Italians should show themselves so much better at attacking ships in harbor than we do." He then asked about their own "Frogman Teams." The answer was cold, Great Britain had none.

Admiral of Submarine Command Sir Max Horton immediately started the X-craft program with his personal supervision through its construction and teething stage. Once trials were successfully completed and volunteers trained, the 12th Submarine

Flotilla was authorized and Operation Source was born.

The X-craft were mini-subs just 51 feet long. Each had a gross weight of 35 tons, and a crew of four. Their weapon was two externally mounted "explosive side cargoes"each containing two tons of amatol. To deliver, X-craft had positioned itself beneath its target, the crew would set the side cargo's timer and then release it to fall to the sea bottom. After that, they (hopefully) cruise out of range before the side cargo exploded.

On Sept. 11, 1943 at 8:12 a.m., and X-craft sub did what its crew was trained to do. The cargo was dropped under the Tirpitz, and the charges detonated. The explosion ripped holes in the battleship's hull, rupturing fuel tanks and flooding compartments. The damage caused a two-degree list that it would take years to repair.

Before the explosion, one X-craft was seen and fired upon but managed to lay the charges, with escape impossible and the timers ticking, they surfaced, scuttled the sub and surrendered to the Germans. This crew was on deck and saw the Germans preparing to put divers in the water and warned them not to. They said in 5 minutes, we will all be mashed potatoes.

To get to Norway where the Tirpitz was moored, the mini-subs were towed from Scotland behind conventional subs. It was a long and dangerous journey with an X-craft and crew lost. During the attack, crews fought through submarine nets with one craft being entangled and lost.

For their roles in Operation Source, the crews received the Victoria Cross. The success of the program paved the way for the British SAS, or Special Air Service that remains the equivalent to our US Navy Seals.

By 1944, the USA had its own "Frogmen" who were instrumental in the Pacific war and D-day invasions. But the Italians were the first to be successful in using underwater combatants in war.

September 11th appears throughout history to be a noteworthy day for both good and bad events. Beside the 9/11 attack on the World Trade Center, and the attack on the U.S. Consulate in Benghazi, there also is The Battle of Sterling where William Wallace first led his army to victory on September 11, 1297. There are others, but space is short.

# Lehigh supervisors allocate L&L funds, request audits

When the Lehigh Township Supervisors met on August 1, the released the \$5,000 budgeted for the Lehigh and Lausanne Volunteer Fire Company; however, Supervisor Jill Redash-Capossela asked that the 2014, 2015 and 2012 audits be submitted. A 2013 audit had been received at that time, but even though the allocation's release is to be tied to receipt of regular audits of company funds, no other recent audit has been turned over. Redash-Capossela suggested, "I don't have a problem releasing the money, but they need to submit the audits." Supervisor Wayne Wagner agreed and according to Supervisor's Chairman Larry Skinner a letter requesting the audits be sent will go out with the check.

The agreement with the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources, Bureau of State Parks regarding maintenance of Leslie Run Road was signed by the Supervisors. Among the provisions that are included is a 90-day written notice prior to the desired date for any termination of the agreement.

No equipment or surplus items owned by the Township will be offered for the Council of Governments surplus sale.

The Planning Commission reorganized in July and met to discuss a subdivision of property submitted by Joe and Teresa Barna. Zoning Officer Leonard Weston is

reviewing the application for a side vard variance. Once that review is completed the application will be heard by the Zoning Hearing Board.

The contract for work on Pump House Road listed a completion date prior to when the paperwork was received by the Township. It was unclear whether the month or the year was incorrect. Redash-Capossela questioned whether a schedule of payments was included.

Skinner reported on the issuance of a new address 55 Indian Run Road.

He also reported that Murphy's Lumber has two of the three doors that the Township needs. According to Skinner they should be painted before being installed.

A \$150 sign made by Dawn's Vinyl of Weatherly was approved to provide information and direction to those using the recycling bins located in the parking lot.

Redash-Capossela noted that the county is not taking part in this year's gypsy moth spraying program due to the cost. Individual property owners may secure contracts for the work themselves.

Several complaints were fielded by the supervisors over the past month, ranging from noise issues in Rockport to high grass on an unoccupied property on Buck Mountain Road.

At the meeting, township resident Barb Tissier reported that the dumpster by her house was "attacked" by bears and garbage was everywhere. While the dumpster was returned to an upright position, no one cleaned up the garbage.

John Capossela asked why the PennDOT work was done the way it was and urged the township to take whatever action possible. Secretary Carol Lenahan replied that the section of the Weatherly/White Haven Road to which he referred was in Luzerne County and therefore a part of the Scranton PennDOT maintenance. Capossela urged them to go directly to the governor instead of dealing with local or other state officials.

During the meeting Larry Skinner noted the recent death of Glennys Sanute.

# Advisors/appointments topics at August WASB meetings

During the August 3 caucus meeting of the Weatherly Area School Board, Gerry Grega questioned why the district has not sought volunteers to serve as game workers, ticket takers, clock operators and game managers. These positions pay \$30 per night, except for the game manager which pays \$45 per event (but is only used when the Athletic Director is unavailable). Grega also wanted to know if the positions were advertised; "Is it open to the public? Why these same people year after vear?"

Fifteen individuals, Jennifer Coxe, Lori DeMoor, Connie Derr, Beth Dolinsky, Tracy Earhart, John Furmanchin, Jeanna Genetti, Teresa Hartz, Melissa Isom, Leann Miller, John McGee, Andrea Romig, Nicole Selert, Robert Selert amd Kellye Zoscin, were approved at the regular meeting on August 10 despite Grega's no vote.

That no vote also applied to approval of the volunteer weight room supervisors Brian Kaminski, Kellye Zoscin and Scott Zoscin. Grega asked the same question about having the same weight room supervisors. He also said he'd like to see the weight room open to the public.

It applied also to appointment of Jim Henry Investigations for security services at athletic events at a cost of \$16 per hour with a minimum of 3 hours billed per event. The appointment of athletic training services to be provided by Geisinger at a rate of \$45 per hour

was also approved by a 6-1 vote, with Grega voting no. Board members who voted for these four items were Girard Fewins, Bill Knepper, Georgeann Herling, Chad Obert, Matt vonFrisch and Brian O'Donnell. Board members Brandon Pugh and Amy Potsko were absent from both meetings in August. Herling was not at the caucus session, but attended the voting meeting.

Many advisors and coaches were listed on the agenda. The board chose to act on just a handful, leaving the band director, chorus director, Student Government, yearbook, Envirothon, National Honor Society and other posts unfilled. Approved by a 6-0 vote with Grega abstaining were class advisors - Class of 2017 - Jennifer Coxe and Jacquiline Grier; Class of 2018 - AnnaMarie Luckwaldt and Lisa Weston; Class of 2019 - Donnell Stump and Tracy Blackwell; and Class of 2020 - Connie Derr and Toni Gerhart. Also approved were Scott Zoscin as Athletic Director; Julia Grega as assistant Girls Soccer Coach; and William Bartel as Varsity Girls Soccer Coach.

At the caucus meeting, Grega had questioned re-appointing McGee as Audio Visual Coordinator since he had resigned from that post last year. Grega alleged that McGee did not want to fill out the activity sheet, and suggested that he be prevented from holding the post for five years.\* Grega also asked that the volunteer positions be taken separately from the paid positions. He suggested that from time to time "some

of these volunteers end up getting paid, automatically—even though it was never meant to be."

Volunteers approved in August include Denise Stadnik - Interact; Rebekah McFadden - TATU; Melissa Isom - Girls Soccer; Kellye Zoscin - Girls Volleyball; Judith Kunkle and Jennifer Coxe - Varsity Cheerleading.

With the death of cross country coach Jonathan Kiddish occurring just before the season was set to begin, a new coach was needed for the program to continue. Obert nominated Paul Schertrumf and Scott Coll as co-coaches. That motion was defeated with Grega, O'Donnell, Herling and Knepper voting no. A unanimous vote then named Schertrumf to the post.

Three Title I Instructional Aides were re-approved: Rachael Markovchick, Debra Spaide and Sharlene Strauss. There were four aides last year, but when one of them was hired as secretary to replace Lucille Hill, the board decided not to fill that Title I Aide position.

Barry Veet was appointed contractual part-time ESL teacher.

John Shelley was appointed Special Education longterm substitute for the first semester. The salary will be based on BS, step 1 (one half of \$43,017) and benefits per the WEA contract.

John McGee and Shane Moran were approved as homebound instruction teachers at \$30 per session.

Salary adjustments had been listed on the August 3 agenda as 3% increases; however, on August 10, the agenda had them listed as 1.5% increases. Knepper and Fewins made a motion to change them again to 2%. That motion was defeated with Obert, O'Donnell, von-Frisch and Grega voting no and Fewins and Knepper joined by Herling with a yes vote.

Grega noted that at the executive session the week before, the 1.5% figure was agreed to. Taken individually, a 1.5% pay raise was approved for Teresa Barna, Administrative Assistant/Payroll Clerk; also for Cathy Lafey, Business Office Secretary; and Act 93 Administrators -Assistant Business Manager Brenda Parise; Maintenance Supervisor Bill Moyer; and Principal Sandra Slavick. It was suggested that Middle/ High School Principal Amanda Zaremba be considered for a pay raise as well, but board members disagreed noting the short length of time that she had held the position.

Agreements were approved between the district and Behavioral Health Associates; Carbon-Monroe-Pike Drug & Alcohol Commission, Inc.; and The Meadows Psychiatric Center. An agreement between Carbon Lehigh Intermediate Unit 21 and WASD for Discovery Streaming Digital

Library at a cost of \$284.24 was approved. The Alternative Education for Disruptive Youth Agreement of Services between PA Treatment and Healing and WASD was given the go-ahead at rates of \$66 per day, \$71 per day for Special Education AEDY.

Board president Fewins offered the opinion that the state and federal government are bullying the school district by threatening to withhold funds if the board approved a controversial policy regarding Student Physical Privacy. Fewins asked, "When are the rights of the majority of students going to come first?" After the board voted to table the second reading by a 6-1 vote, with Grega the only member opposing the motion to table, Grega replied, "You're throwing in the towel." vonFrisch disagreed saving, "tabling opens it up for more discussion."

The next Weatherly Area School Board meeting will be Wednesday, September 14 starting at 7 p.m. in the Middle School large group instruction room. The public is welcome to attend.





# Seth's Sightings by Seth Isenberg

When I can catch a few minutes these past few weeks, I've been doing some summer reading. Recently I was introduced to Walter Mosley's books and have been eagerly reading up on the exploits of Leonid McGill. For a bit more fun, I blazed through the most recent Janet Evanovich. When I finish my current Mosley, I have a sci-fi fantasy to consume next.

Part of the early week, I was worried about us having a visit from Hurricane Hermine. It's great that it went out to sea. I want to keep the leaves on the trees to get a full fall foliage show in October.

This past Friday, Ruth and I were able to enjoy an evening at the GDS Fair in Newfoundland. We arrived as the sun was setting, so the lights from the stands and amusement rides had just come on. The night's big entertainment—a demolition derby had a large part of the crowd in the stands so it was a terrific time to wander around. There were flowers, plants, vegetables and other contest entries to view, plus a small but appealing display of local animals. We met the owner of a rather special ram, the fair's grand champion with hair like little dreadlocks (a spectacular coat). While at the Fair, we bumped into a number of Pocono Plateau locals during our aimless meandering.

Our Saturday was spent manning a site as part of White Haven's first townwide yard sale. We were selling some old classical and rock vinyl records, so got to talk music.

Sunday we gathered up my uncle Slater and attended Scandinavian Fest, a few miles from his home in New Jersey. The event is held in a private park property bought early last century by a Scandinavian immigrant association. The site now hosts a civic organization that promotes the culture, plus has a spring-fed outdoor pool, pavilion, and yearround hall. The Fest hosted dozens of vendors and a variety of food stands, but the most fun was watching some of the demonstrations. We learned about mead making-two pounds of honey, and browsed the crafts and food vendors. But most entertaining thing that afternoon was the wife-carrying contest. Strong, game men hoisted their women over their shoulders, and then ran an obstacle course of somewhat over 200 feet over tires, logs, a platform and then two water-filled kiddie pools. While most were able

to carry all the way around, there were trips, drops and slips, including a bunch in the pools-only one full immersion. Last among the contestants, one petite wiry woman and her tall thin young man. To everyone's surprise, she picked him up piggy back. and to the amazement of all of us. she succeed in carrying him all the way around. At the end she was greeted by a number of the women who had been carried with whoops and high fives. The traditional award for the winner of the event is the wife's weight in beer.

Monday, we went to pick up some of our newspapers in Shamokin. Knoebels is 15 minutes away from there, so we combined an afternoon at the amusement park with the pickup. It was a beautiful day and it was nice to be out driving. We traveled through towering cornfields on our remote but direct way in to Knoebels (through Sheppton and past Ringtown and Aristes). It seemed that the corn had a slow start, but the fields look great now. We passed through a forest that had been attacked by gypsy moths earlier, and now

seemed to be mostly recovered. Perhaps the hot summer has been bad for the caterpillars.

Mongeluzi of Momenee & Associates illustrated specs for Willowbrook Planned Residential's initial phase set to start next spring. Joined by Stabilis senior project manager, Shane Rensmon, he said they intend to start with four units, then graduate to eight buildings, with additional amenities.

Listing two tennis courts, a basketball court, and golf course, Rensmon emphasized, "We don't want to compete" with Split Rock's existing course next door.

Calling current amenities "overstressed now," resident Leonard Tiscio pushed for more with other residents suggesting a pool.

Resident Bob Dobash urged use of an access road at Moseywood, "rather than through Split Rock."

During the regular public meeting with business manager Lisa Klem reporting, "We have a lot of interest" in the construction of a traffic light at Route 903 and Lake Harmony Road, yet zero bids were received.

Suggesting setting an end of August 2017 date for completion might encourage bid flow, she explained, " a lot are too busy and can't meet the [February 2017] cutoff." Agreeing, supervisors will make the change and seek new bids.

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# Hit hard by graduation, Crestwood stickers face challenging season

The 2015 season was another great chapter in the storied history of the Crestwood High School field hockey program. The Comets went 16-1, won another District 2 Class 2A championship and advanced all the way to the PIAA semifinals, where their season ended at the hands of Twin Valley.

Repeating that type of season will be a tall order in 2016, as no less than seven key players graduated and are now playing in college.
