Harvest Festival sets new roots up the road

"Honestly, I can't wait to take my kids to this year's festival," smiled Mayor Fred Courtright following Mount Pocono's September 6 meeting. Prepared for another spectacular turnout from 9 to 6 p.m. on Saturday, September 24, the popular Harvest Festival's new location will be about a mile up the road.

Previously held along the municipality's major thoroughfare, this year they're taking things in a new direction– north on Route 611, to a safer, larger location on Pocono Mountain Volunteer Fire Company carnival grounds.

The mayor explains, "The Festival can now do things that it was constrained from doing previously for space and layout reasons while providing easier access and parking."

That center of congestion had the council meeting focused on continuing road reviews with council member Jeff Woehrle reporting PennDOT will be providing two speed radar devices on Route 611. It was agreed to delay buying the borough's own portable devices costing \$6,098 until after seeing how the PennDOT ones do. "It's not going to be a problem one thing can solve," said Courtright.

Council approved purchase through Co-Stars of a Swenson Model STCC Cross Conveyor from E.M. Kutz to discharge lines of gravel for paving, considering it more efficient than dumping then picking up with a backhoe to spread the material, calling the \$7,529 investment a "much faster" method.

Bills totaling \$1,184,742.69 were approved for payment.

Present were council members Woehrle, Karl Davis, Mike Oser, Fran O'Boyle, Claudette Williams and Donna Casole, along with solicitor Jim Fareri, Mayor Courtright, secretary Lori Noonan and approximately 10 residents.

Mount Pocono's next meeting is 7 p.m. Monday, October 3 at Municipal Offices on Route 611 in the Borough.

Two historical markers dedicated

The Labor Day weekend was a busy one for the history of Tobyhanna Township. Two historical roadside markers were dedicated on Saturday, commemorating The Stagecoach Inn and The Battle of Locust Ridge.

Located along Route 423 across from the spillway of Lake Naomi, The Stagecoach Inn historical roadside marker was unveiled. It was donated by the Lake Naomi Club, and is located at the site of the 1840's Inn. Robert Jones, General Manager of the Lake Naomi Club, dedicated the marker on behalf of the club.

The Battle of Locust Ridge historical roadside marker is located on Locust Ridge Road, just south of Slutter Road in the Pocono Lake area. It faces the location where the Battle occurred in 1784. The marker was donated by the Arrowhead Lake Community Association and was unveiled and dedicated by Eric Usbeck, General Manager.

The Marker Advisors have a busy fall schedule with 15 more markers to dedicate. Up next will be Jacob Blakeslee, Jr. scheduled for this Saturday, September 17 at 10 a.m. Its location is on the west side of Route 115 north of Blakeslee, just north of Homestead Lane. The dedication will take place just north of the site on the east side of Route 115.

The schedule can be viewed on MATT's web site, as well as each dedicated historical roadside marker with additional historical accounts. The website address is www.tobyhannatwphistory.org/ markers.html At each marker's site, visitors can scan a QR decal affixed to the marker pole, which will automatically navigate to the web site. Celebrate Hispanic Heritage Month at the Library

For the first time in the Pocono Mountain area, Hispanic Heritage Month will enjoy an official opening. The Hughes Library in Stroudsburg will host a two-hour celebration of song, dance, and informed commentary about the diversity of cultures within the Hispanic family of nationalities on September 17 beginning at 3 p.m.

Featured in the program is the dance troupe from Allentown directed by Flor Vélez of the Association for Puerto Rican Cultural Preservation. The young people will perform a variety of typical folklore dances: seis chorreao, bomba, and plena. Each demonstrates a different cultural component of Puerto Rico's mix of Taíno, Spanish and African influences.

"We are going to show how Spain's culture crossed the Atlantic and was recreated in the different regions of Latin America," said Professor Emeritus Anthony M. Stevens-Arroyo. "Each year, a different culture will be featured," he added, "so that learning about the richness of our cultures will be fun."

The list of songs and dances begins with a villancico, or Christmas carol, composed in Spain in 1512. The religious background of many traditions will be presented with a performance of gozos by the Hermandad del Señor de los Milagros. Founded in Lima, Peru to commemorate a miraculous preservation from a 1655 earthquake, the order has an official branch located in Cresco.

Mexico will be well represented and the public will be invited to learn how to sing Las Mañanitas, the Mexican version of Happy Birthday. Argentina will be represented with a performance of the national dance, the tango by a talented duo led by Jessica Burns. The event will be hosted by Christina Luna, a local celebrity known for her service to the media through Café with Christina. The live presentations will be complemented with recorded performances.

The Federation of Latinos for Education about the Cultures of Hispanic America, known as FLECHA, has organized the program with funding from the Eastern Monroe Public Library. Co-sponsors include the Monroe Council on Inclusion and Diversity Associates. The purpose is to promote county-wide recognition of Hispanic Heritage Month that runs from September 15 until October 15 every year.

This year's opening will feature a collection of photographs by Lorena Román, who has just returned from a well-received exposition in Mexico. Her work will be on exhibit for the month at the Smithfields Library until October 15, when the official celebration will close with a panel discussion of her art and the community of Latinos in the Poconos.

Admission to the event is free. Spanish clubs are invited to represent local



As the NFL football season kicked off on September 8, so did United Way of Monroe County's 2016 Campaign. United Way held its 2016 Campaign Kickoff and Day of Caring on September 8 at 8:00 a.m. at the Barley Creek Brewing Company in Tannersville. United Way announced the 2016 Honorary Campaign Chair, Sharon Laverdure active community member and recently retired Superintendent of East Stroudsburg School District - who will be promoting the work of the United Way and its partners over the next few months.

President and CEO of United Way of Monroe County, Michael Albert, spoke at the event, highlighting some of the major challenges facing Monroe County, "We know that Monroe County has a significant population considered the 'working poor'. A high cost of living - especially housing, combined with relatively low wages creates a situation where regular people are having trouble getting by," said Albert. "But there is good news here. This is a vibrant and motivated community that wants not only to survive, but to thrive. If we focus our efforts

and work together on a few key issues to improve the financial stability of individuals and families in the community, we can start to move the needle on challenges affecting those who are struggling." Albert went on to highlight four Impact Initiatives on which the organization will be focused over the next four years, and for which United Way is looking to raise funds:

Enhancing Food Access - There are dozens of food pantries and supplemental feeding programs in Monroe County looking to feed those who are hungry. These programs are not just for people living on the street, but individuals and families who need a little extra support to make ends meet. United Way is looking to mirror successful Food Access initiatives across the state and country that bring together numerous local partners to establish an enhanced food system that increases efficiency and coordination. This enables the community to serve more people with higher quality and healthier supplemental food. United Way will partner with key agencies in the area to establish the Monroe County Hunger Coalition later this year to help spearhead this initiative.

Supporting Working Families - Breaking a cycle of poverty requires investments in education - especially early-childhood development - as well as efforts that help families to meet their current needs. Free or low-cost quality pre-K services and after-school and day-care programs achieve this double-goal through a single effort. They do so by providing enhanced educational services for children, while also enabling and empowering parents to maintain a more flexible working environment that raises the possibility of increasing their families' earnings.

Connecting our Community - United Way's recent needs assessment revealed that a number of community members are eligible for existing services, but are not accessing them. Increasing access to existing programs will be achieved through information and referral serices (such as Poconolnfo), transportation assistance and case management services. This initiative will guide individuals and families through the often complicated and cumbersome processes of accessing federal, state and local services and will help narrow the service-access gaps in our county.

Providing a Safety Net -Despite the best efforts to promote long term support and reduce poverty, some community members simply fall through the cracks and are in need of help NOW. United Way's Safety Net Initiative will ensure that those seeking shelter, behavioral health services, or emergency services will have access to support when they need it most.

To close out the Kickoff, United Way launched its Annual Day of Caring - a special one-day event that gathers individuals and employees from local companies to come together to provide a day of service and make a difference in their community. Over 160 volunteers headed out into the community today to carry out hands-on projects assisting the needs of ten local non-profit organizations in Monroe County. Projects included everything from painting, landscaping, minor construction, classroom rehabilitation, and delivering items such as meals and clothing.



Summer is not letting go even as next week will be the start of fall. It was relatively hot. I say relative because I feel temperatures in the 80s are hot, and we've just come through a period when the temperatures were in the 90s. Saturday we spent our afternoon at the Woof-Fest in Long Pond, raising money for the Monroe Animal League, manning the Blakeslee Rotary Club booth. 


