

Totino was waiting for a price from Pennsey Supply regarding other paving in the borough. The work originally scheduled by the railroad at the crossings on Berwick Street and Northumberland Street is on hold, due to an impasse between PennDOT and the Reading, Blue Mountain and Northern Railroad. The railrod had proposed raising the rails by two inches on Berwick Street, but did not want to pay for engineering drawings for the project. PennDOT will not approve the work without them. The railroad does not want to do the Northumberland crossing unless it can do the Berwick crossing at the same time.

Council discussed the option of filing for a formal hearing before the PUC, and noted that if they went that way, money which would have been allocated for fixing drainage and paving would go to legal costs instead.

Solicitor Don Karpowich presented revisions to the borough personnel policy. Discussion of provisions regarding accumulation of sick time and comp time was postponed until an executive session after the meeting.

Borough manager Linda Szoke said she hopes to have the first reading of the budget in October.

The Lions Club was given permission to hold the Halloween parade October 16, with a rain date of October 23. The Chamber of Commerce was given permission to close the 400 block of Main Street October 8 and 9 for the Fall Festival.

Council member Bob Lamson was appointed president pro temp, to preside in the absence of president and vice-president.

Fire Chief Dean Raudenbush reported that the new UTV unit is in service, and members have been certified to operate it.

The recreation committee has approved buying lights for the basektball court at Pine Street from their funds. The light will be on a timer.

Building & grounds committee chair Rose Swerdon pointed out issues at Linesville and Lehigh Parks, including limbs that need cutting.

The water payment for the month was \$16,420, which broke the previous month's record total.

Present were council members Charlie Best, Patty Horn, Lamson, Clyde Morrison, Tim Janosco, and Swerdon; council president John Klem and Mayor Fred Meier were absent.

ATTACKS and PROVOCATIONS on U.S. Assets Increasing

This Monday, two missiles fired from Yemen landed near an American destroyer in the Red Sea, the U.S. Navy said. This is the second such launch in the crucial international waterway in recent days. This incident is in the wake of months of stories like: Iran captures U.S. Gun Boat Crew, Iran provokes U. S. Warship, and Iran locks targeting radar on U. S. Aircraft in International Waters.

Iranian Navy Rear Admiral Ali Fadavi told Iran's news agency that his forces have been building replicas of U.S. aircraft carriers for years in order to practice blowing them up. He said that his forces have the capacity to sink U.S. warships in 50 seconds. "Aircraft carriers are the symbol of America's military might... we must and will sink the carriers."

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
Christina Caravella is Sept. Senior of the Month

Comets soar past Tunkhannock and back into playoff race

For the first time since opening night back in August, the Crestwood football Comets tasted victory. On Friday night at home, the Comets treated their fans and themselves to a one-sided win that brought back memories of their unbeaten run to a District 2 championship just two years ago. The win not only snapped the Comets' five-game losing streak, it enabled them to leapfrog Tunkhannock (2-5) and take over the seventh spot in the race for the upcoming eight-team District 2 Class 4A tournament.

First-year quarterback Chase Passman broke out with 130 rushing yards and four touchdowns, part of a 412-yard ground assault, and the defense came up with its biggest performance of the year as the Comets rocked Tunkhannock 49-6. "Chase is going to be our quarterback from here on out, and we think he's going to be a very good football player," Crestwood head coach Greg Myers said after the long-awaited win. "He had a great night. He needed this night after the last couple weeks he's had. But he did good things. He's got the respect of his teammates and he leads the team for us."

The night coincided with the return of team leader Lance Blass, who had missed the last three games due to injury. The senior, who played all over the place in the Crestwood offense, sparked the Comets right off the bat. After Pat Colo's interception, Blass took a halfback toss and pulled up, passing to Kyle Richards for a 36-yard completion that set up Passman's first touchdown run, a 3-yarder to plays later.

Passman followed with scoring runs of 9 and 51 yards, and Michael Macri put one in from a yard out to continue the onslaught. Then, with one minute remaining in the half and no time outs, the Comets went 79 yards in four running plays to put the game out of reach.

Pat Rother (9 carries, 137 yards) and Macri (11-107) each carried twice in the drive, with Rother taking it in from 21 yards out to put the finishing touches on a 35-point first half for the Comets. Richards, who got his first taste of placekicking, hit all five of his PAT tries in the half and all seven on the night. Passman added his fourth touchdown, a 7-yarder, and Rother capped the scoring with a 48-yard dash in the second half to put the finishing touches on the Comets 462-yard night.

Crestwood stickers roll to three victories

Crestwood's field hockey machine continued to roll this past week, logging wins over Tunkhannock (11-0), Lackawanna Trail (5-1) and Pittston Area (2-0).

Crestwood 11, Tunkhannock 0 - Sarah Richards and Chloe Green each notched a hat trick, and teammate Madi Granoski added two goals as Crestwood routed Tunkhannock on Monday. The Comets peppered the Tigers with 30 shots on goal, held Tunkhannock without one, and had a 12-1 advantage in penalty corners in the one-sided win.

Richards scored all three of her goals unassisted in the first half as Crestwood pulled out to an 8-0 lead by intermission. She also assisted on Jordan Olenginski's first-half goal. Greene scored a pair of first-half goals, while Arden Morgans and Granoski added single tallies.

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
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Wrecker boys soccer team back in District II playoffs

'Canes Invitational at Schuylkill Haven in a course-record 10:40, placed first in 9:22 at the 1.6-mile Cardinal Clash at Pine Grove, and won the Mrs. T's Invitational at Tuscarora State Park. His time of 11:53 beat his nearest competitor by 59 seconds. "I'm pretty surprised I've had this much success, but now I just really can't wait to just keep breaking records and become the best runner I can be," Zoscin said. "It's just been really great so far."

"I'm surprised at how awesome a season he's had," noted Schertrumpf, who has seen Zoscin excel in athletics since his Little League days, and watched him help lead the Weatherly Area junior high basketball team to an undefeated season last winter. "He has that ability to run," Schertrumpf said. "He will do above anything you ask him to do. He has that ability, and with his work ethic, that's what's going to take him to areat things."

How Zoscin's current success will transfer to next season at the 3.1-mile distance – and against stiffer competition — remains to be seen. "It's definitely going to be a lot tougher," Schertrumpf said. "He'll be running against juniors and seniors. I don't foresee him winning all his races, but he will be one of the top runners in the league."

"I know I'm not going to expect as much success as I've had this year because there's more experienced runners," Zoscin said, preferring to live in the present. "I'm just



focusing on right now. The future will come, and once that comes I'll be ready." In the meantime, there are two more races to be run this fall. On Wednesday, the Wreckers were to close out their regular season at Schuylkill Haven, a course he already holds the record at from the 'Canes Invitational. Then it's the Schuylkill League Championships on Oct. 19. "I'm going to train pretty hard and try to break my personal best from this race at Schuylkill Haven," he said.

As for the league meet, Schertrumpf likes his chances of bringing home the gold and completing an unbeaten season. "No one has been within 45 seconds of him in the league," he said. "I don't see anyone touching him."

With the memory of Kiddish providing that extra motivation, Zoscin will be hard to beat. "I just think of Coach Kiddish running by my side and him telling me what to do, and whatever to do to get better throughout each race," he said.

Wreckers' Scott Zoscin running away from cross-country competition

When Scotty Zoscin crossed the finish line last Wednesday, it was more than just another junior high cross-country victory for the Weatherly Area eighth grader. It was a tribute to the coach that helped get him there, the man who made him believe that anything was possible.

Cheered on by dozens of fans, teammates and family members, Zoscin powered through Weatherly Area's 1.8mile course in a blistering time of 10 minutes, 58 seconds, beating his nearest competitor by nearly 21/2 minutes. With it he established a new school record and took down the course record of 11:12 previously set by Mahanoy Area's Adam Soriano in 2015. "When I crossed the line I just thought of my coach," Zoscin said, referring to Jonathan Kiddish. "When he passed away in August, I knew I was going to do it in this race for him. Breaking that record, it really got to me. I'm really glad I did it for him in this race."

Their story began last cross country season, when Zoscin - then a seventh grader decided to start running as a way of getting in shape for basketball season. "My first race was last August, 2015. I wasn't expecting as much. How good I am now, I wasn't expecting that. I actually started running to condition for basketball. Once I started to get good I was like this is pretty exciting, and I just kept running."

Pushed by Kiddish to tap into his potential, he went from being just another runner to one of the finest junior high runners in the region. "When he was our coach he

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really knew everything about running. He really knew how to drive people to become the best they could be." Zoscin logged hundreds of miles during the offseason, and was on course to have a strong eighth

grade year. When Kiddish passed away suddenly just two weeks before the start of the cross-country season, it left a huge void at the top of the program. His passing pushed Zoscin's drive to succeed to even greater heights. "Coach K saw the potential in Scotty and motivated him," stated current coach Paul Schertrumpf, a Zoscin family friend who stepped up and took over the program in late August. "Over the summer, before Coach K passed, Scotty ran a

lot. He put the time in."

"When he passed away, it really motivated me to push farther than my expectations and what he wanted me to go for," Zoscin said. "I just really worked hard this past offseason, and this is all for him."

Zoscin's season started at the top on Sept. 3, when he outdistanced more than 200 runners in 11:12 to take first place at the 42nd Cliff Robbins Memorial Race. He hasn't looked back since - except to see where his closest competitor is. He has won all five of his league races at North Schuylkill, Shenandoah Valley, Jim Thorpe, Minersville and Weatherly, taking down course records along the way.

His most recent record-breaking performance prior to Wednesday was Sept. 28 when he clocked a 9:29 on Minersville's 1.65-mile course, besting another of Soriano's records (9:31 in 2014).

"He's 5-for-5, which is pretty cool," Schertrumpf said.

Zoscin is unbeaten at four invitationals as well. After claiming the Cliff Robbins Race, he won the 1.7-mile

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
