China's Military Build-Up, at our Expense

China's economy is booming with an 8.4% growth in Gross Domestic Product (GDP). It has been increasing each year for the past 6 years. Compare that to our GDP at home that free fell in 2009 and now remains stagnant between 1.0 and 2.5%. Bottom line is we are going nowhere, we are building nothing, we are exporting nothing and our workers are earning less compared to nations we conduct open trade with. Call it bad trade deals, greedy politicians or whatever you will, the bottom line is no increasing good jobs, no increasing wages and no increasing wealth for the Government, just mounting out of control debt.

But the side of the coin I want to talk about is China. China has a fast growing economy and wealth, and as a result, ever increasing military build-up with the largest

standing army in the world. By the end of 2016, their economy will overtake that of ours. They have growing tech, engineering and manufacturing skills, unlimited wealth and greatest source of people for military service on earth. If we convert the formula to force projection, it does not add up to self-defense.

The United States is known for some big items to defend our shores and our people. Our aircraft carriers that project power worldwide are a big deterrent of aggression. Our communications, computer technology and satellites provide instant worldwide command, control and advanced warnings. Let's look at what China is heavily investing all the money brought in from bad trade deals, currency manipulation and loss of our manufacturing, jobs and energy.

SUPER CARRIERS: The first Chinese-built super carriers will likely be operational

sometime at the beginning of the next decade. China now has one operational carrier. The formation of carrier battle groups will enable them to conduct comprehensive sea control and power projection operations and enhance their long-range operational capabilities.

NUCLEAR SUBMARINES, next generation technology: The new 11,000-ton Jinclass Type 94 boomers have been under development by the People's Liberation Army Navy for the last decade. They are China's first real entry into the sea-based deterrent world. One is set to launch soon, two more are under construction.

SUPERSONIC CARRIER KILLER MISSILES: the new YJ-12 is the most dangerous anti-ship missile China has produced thus far. The arrival of the YJ-12 is a clear indication the U.S. Navy is falling further behind in the missile competition.

SATELLITE KILLER MIS-SILES: During October 2015, the Chinese fired off a rocket that could turn a satellite into scraps, the HQ-19 ASAT.

To be able project power or invasion forces, a nation needs ships and aircraft. China is adding three new amphibious assault troop landings ships to the formidable force they already have. A fleet of new heavy lift military transport aircraft to rapidly move troops and supplies world-wide is being developed with new design and technology.

China's military dedicated computer hacking unit (Unit 61398) is believed to be staffed by thousands of Chinese "cyber-troops". Its personnel are highly trained in computer networking but must also be proficient in English as most of its targets are in the U.S.

With all this going on, Chinese people have plenty of jobs and work with all the

manufacturing, steel production plus added military and defense contracts. China's intent does not look to be building up defense, it looks like expansion - expansion into the world as a super power with the USA in its sights.

Now add that they want to pass the Trans Pacific Trade Deal sending more work abroad to strengthen those who will oppose us just doesn't sound very smart or promising for "we the people" at home here. A few get richer while millions get poorer. Our adversaries get stronger and we get weaker. Open trade with bad deals, globalization, open borders with unchecked immigration, refugees, drugs and dangerous materials and weapons all flooding in, the United States of America we all know, some fought for and many died for will be unrecognizable in another ten years if something does not change.

"We owe a great deal of gratitude to DCNR, the Bureau of Forestry, and the people of Northeastern Pennsylvania who fully accepted the responsibility of building a great future for Pennsylvania by continuing the enduring legacy of Gifford Pinchot with the conservation of some of our most pristine forest land that will forever bear a most appropriate name, the Pinchot State Forest District," said Senator Yudichak.

DCNR Secretary Dunn and State Forester Dan Devlin also touched on Pinchot's legacy in their remarks. "Pennsylvania is blessed with 20 state forest districts and this one -- bearing a new name in the northeast area of the state personifies Gifford Pinchot's crusade for healthy.







Riding the play of their senior leader in his final home game, the Crestwood Comets earned their second straight victory on Friday night. Lance Blass rushed 29 times for a career-high 325 yards and four touchdowns as the Comets held on to beat Hanover Area 28-20 and solidified their play-



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

off chances in the process. But as good as Blass was, it took a huge stop by junior line-backer Owen Grigas to help the Comets keep the lead late in the game.

Hanover Area pulled within two points (22-20) on Christian Percy's 31-yard touchdown catch with just over two minutes to play. From there, the Hawkeyes went for two points and the tie.

Quarterback Brandon Chafin faked an inside handoff and tried to score on bootleg run, only to be greeted by Grigas, who smothered him and dropped him in the backfield. "That was the play we were expecting," Comets head coach Greg Myers said afterward. "We've seen that two-point play from them a couple times this season ... We drilled it all week, and obviously our kids listened to us, and they stepped up and made a heck of a play."

From there, Blass and the Comets worked the clock until the senior standout scored his fourth touchdown of the night - a 39-yard run with five seconds remaining - to lock up the Se-

nior Night win. "In a game like this, he needs the ball in his hands," Myers said. "He certainly proved that. Especially when we got to use some clock, he's the guy we want with the ball in his hands."

Crestwood trailed 14-8 at halftime following a 64-yard scoring run by Hanover Area's Sean Coleman, but used Kevin Lusewitz's blocked field goal attempt to gain momentum in the third quarter. After the Comets took over, Kyle Richards converted a third-down pass to Blass to keep a drive alive, and Blass did the rest, breaking free for a 48-yard touchdown run that put the Comets back on top 15-14. With 4:29 to play in the fourth quarter, Blass 21-yard scoring run made it a 22-14 lead, setting up the lategame flurry.

After missing three games due to injury, Blass returned in Week 7 and had a limited role in the Comets' 49-6 rout of Tunkhannock that snapped a five-game slide. In Week 8, Blass was near 100 percent for the first time since the early part of the season, and it

showed. His 325 rushing yards nearly doubled his entire output (180 yards) this season, and gave the Comets (3-5) an all-important win as they hit the home stretch with road games at Wyoming Valley West and Hazleton Area. They are currently seventh in the eight-team District 2 Class 4A playoff race.

"That's emotional for everybody, all the seniors coming together," said Blass, who lauded the play of his offensive line in the win. "That's just a good way for me to go out on my own field."

The Comets finished with 384 of their 395 yards on the ground, with quarterback Chase Passman getting another 49 yards. Rushing leader Pat Rother carried just two times for 13 yards. Meanwhile, the defense held Hanover Area (4-4) to 247 total yards, and the Comets withstood a pair of turnovers to pocket the big win.

The Comets will visit Valley West on Friday night before closing at Hazleton Area in Week 10. A win in either game will likely lock up a playoff berth.

Scotty Zoscin sets another CC record, remains unbeaten

Another race, another record for Weatherly Area's Scotty Zoscin. Last week, the eighth-grade runner clocked a 10:34 to win the team's junior high cross country meet at Schuylkill Haven, as the Wreckers defeated both Haven (15-50) and Marian (15-50). Shenandoah Valley edged the Wreckers 23-32.

Zoscin's first-place topped runner-up Diego Olayo (12:09) of Shenandoah Valley by more than a minute-and-ahalf, and broke his own course record of 10:40 set earlier this season at the 'Canes Invitational. He has also set course records at Minersville and in Weatherly where he established the Wreckers' course and school record for 1.8 miles the week before. He has won all six league-meet races and all four invitationals he has run in this season.




