Tobyhanna Township manager shares rural development insights at state leadership conference

Tobyhanna Township Manager John Jablowski served as feature presenter at this year's Governing Institute Pennsylvania Leadership Conference October 18 in Harrisburg. He and Michael Smith, the executive deputy secretary of the PA Department of Agriculture presented a forum entitled "Envisioning the Economic Future of Rural Pennsylva-

nia." Together, they led a discussion on challenges faced by the Commonwealth with a look into solutions.

The focus was on the strengths of Pennsylvania as the nation's third largest rural population, with close to four million residents. The audience of government officials was captivated by the data driven overview of Rural Economic Development created

in partnership with the Center for Rural Pennsylvania.

Tobyhanna Township served as a prime example, blending "rural charm and well thought out economic development," according to Jablowski. The presenters shared ideas about historical and eco-tourism, with strategies for rural recreation and residential opportunities.

In his role as Township

Manager, Jablowski plans to utilize that same knowledge and experience while moving forward with efforts to create a public open space district. Targeting the villages of Blakeslee, Pocono Pines and Pocono Summit, he envisions boutique shopping, recreational amenities, and infrastructure improvements, all while maintaining, "The rural character of the community."

"As part of the changing atmosphere in rural Pennsylvania we must focus on enhancing the experience when visiting, living and working in our communities," he concluded. "I was honored to serve with deputy secretary Smith to present a discussion with statewide leaders on how we can collectively learn from our success and move rural Pennsylvania forward."

SAP offers help to struggling students at PMSD

Pocono Mountain West Junior High guidance counselors described the Student Assistance Program, the school district's "vehicle" for navigation through troubling situations, during the October 19 Pocono Mountain School Board meeting. Nicole Benzie and Christina Tolerico shared stats and facts about how hands-on help from professionals works with teachers and parents to assist students struggling with mental health, anxiety and alcohol

situations affecting their education.

Using a three tier projection with a majority of the student body typically receiving As and Bs, 15 percent experience difficulties being successful in the school setting. SAP, the referral program required by every school in Pennsylvania, steps in to help those students after receiving written consent from parents.

Maintaining parental involvement, PMSD counselors work closely with outside agencies, when needed, to

address matters including truancy. Last year, 633 referrals of 7th to 12th grade students were made with 83% receiving SAP intervention. Benzie explained that some of those referred did not have parental permission, while others were remedied without requiring program assistance.

PMWJHS principal Eric Vogt applauded district counselors emphasizing, "[They] work tirelessly with our students."

Calling "very disconcerting" language in House Bill 530, "a

disappointing effort at Charter reform," solicitor John Freund reviewed key points within the Public School Code act that stands before Pennsylvania's General Assembly.

He explained the funding formula uses students in brick and mortar schools as the basis to calculate the cost for cyber schools, rather than the actual cost to operate. An additional concern is the expansion of a school's charter from five to ten years, which could complicate a district's ability to enforce accountability.

Superintendent Dr. Elizabeth Robison added that dismay over House Bill 530 echoes across the Commonwealth. School director Jacqueline Leonard urged taxpayers to contact their local legislators.

School director Rusty Johnson added, "We are not in favor of this bill."

Pocono Mountain School District Board of Directors next regular meeting is scheduled for 7 p.m. Wednesday, November 2 at the Swiftwater campus Administration building.

PMRES to be BLS provider for all of Coolbaugh

Coolbaugh Township supervisors voted unanimously to designate Pocono Mountain Regional EMS the municipality's BLS (Basic Life Support) responder after expressing concerns over Thornhurst Volunteer Fire and Rescue Ambulance at the October 18 meeting.

"Can you handle it?" asked supervisor Bill Weimer of PM-REMS Operations Manager Denise Doremus.

Responding "yes," she later added, "Regional is already responsible for ALS (Advanced Life Support) calls across the township including Arrowhead Lake and Riverside Estates communities neighboring Thornhurst."

Reasoning "They [Thorn-hurst] no longer have paid crews," Weimer responded to further public inquiry for details at the meeting leading to the decision adding, "Financial concerns that were brought to Thornhurst Township."

Michelle Fairservice asked if those reports were veri-

fied with Weimer stating, "I have verified with someone at Thornhurst."

Calls to Thornhurst Ambulance for comment went unanswered.

Supervisors tabled talks over the Pocono Mountain Regional Police budget until after a 7 p.m. October 25 public budget meeting. Calling for a 6.52% increase in 2017, the township faces an additional

\$138,476.66 in the \$6.1 million budget taking their 37% obligation to over \$2.26 million. A spike in health insurance plus line items including computer support for new CPUs and software contracts were indicated as cause for the increase.

Bills totaling \$ 303,863.20 were approved for payment:
General Fund, \$288,204.41
Sewer Fund, \$14,794.49
Escrow Fund, \$864.30
Supervisors Weimer, Alma
Ruiz-Smith, Juan Adams,
Lynn Kelly and Anthony Lamantia were present for the

meeting along with controller Maureen Mills, solicitor Jerry Hanna and an audience of approximately 30.

Coolbaugh's next meeting is scheduled for 7 p.m. November 1 in the administrative building located on Municipal Drive in Tobyhanna.





Scavello: Senate passes measure to prohibit excessive tethering of dogs

Senator Mario Scavello (R-40) said the Senate approved legislation he's long championed to prohibit animal cruelty in the form of excessive tethering of dogs.

Under House Bill 869, as amended by the Senate, tethering a dog outside for more than nine straight hours would be considered neglect, as would tethering for more than 30 minutes in excessive heat or cold. The measure also outlines the length and type of tether and requires access to

drinking water and shade.

"Chaining a dog outside for most of the day or in extreme conditions has long been, to me, a form of neglect, and I am pleased to support passage of this amended bill to finally outlaw this abuse," said Scavello. "There are times when tethering our dogs is necessary, and the vast majority of citizens do it in a humane manner. But, for too long neglectful owners have been allowed to get away with this awful treatment, and I'm

glad the Senate took action to stop it."

The neglect would be considered a summary offense, punishable by a fine of up to \$750.

Other provisions of the bill include:

The creation of a new definition of "aggravated cruelty to animals" in order to provide tougher penalties for crimes committed against animals.

The addition of horses to Pennsylvania's animal cruelty laws.

A provision for the forfeiture of animals by abusers.

The bill was sent back to the House of Representatives for concurrence on Senate amendments. If approved by the House, it will be sent to the governor to be signed into







Her mother was a nurse for Dr. William Hay, MD, at The Pocono Haven private hospital in Mt. Pocono, which later became the High Point Inn, featuring the well-loved Yankee Doodle Restaurant. Her father, John P. Fretz was a respected businessman who owned the Airport Inn (now Bailey's) in Mount Pocono and was known for hosting the Mount Pocono Horse Shows from 1946 to 1948.




